O'Neill Firemen Assist WARNS AGAINST In Battling Flames at Livestock Market

FIX LOSS AT \$35,000

ATKINSON-One of the costliest fires in recent Holt county history Monday consumed the sales pavilion, offices, scale house, hog barn, hog house and 15 pens belonging to the Atkinson Livestock Market. Ernie Weller, manager of the firm, expressed a theory that the fire originated near the furnace in the pavilion.

Virtually every building was destroyed except one cattle shed, which Mr. Weller credited the assisting O'Neill volunteer fire department with saving.

With more than 3,000 head of livestock in the yards prepara-tory to a special calf sale that day and a regularly scheduled auction on the following day, all were driven safely from the yards and buildings.

Only members of the market staff were in the pavilion when the blaze started. Fire Chief Sime Schaaf, of the Atkinson Department, directed the fire-fighting. The Stuart volunteer fire department was the first to be called for assistance, followed successively by O'Neill, Bassett and fire, water was hosed from hydrants in the heart of Atkinson, a mile away The fire departments "pooled" their hose to make the connection. The blaze was extinguished by

about 3:30 p.m. Twenty-four livestock railroad cars were on the sidings near the market, but were undamaged.

The O'Neill firemen concentrated on saving a cattle shed which was seriously threatened. After playing chemicals on the building for about five minutes, a favorable windshift helped in preventing its destruction.

A resurgent Republican party scored a decisive victory against the Democrats in Tuesday's mid-

term general election. At the national level, the GOP landslide overturned the Democrats for the first time in 15 years, electing at least 23 Senators, 242 Representatives, and 20 Governors. The next Congress will be politically divided against the White House.

In Nebraska, the traditionally stronger GOP wrote a perfect slate with only one Congressional post closely contested. That ounties comprise the district.
