

CRASH FATAL TO EWING YOUTH

Benny Miller, 22, Dies Monday in Norfolk Hospital

EWING—Benny Wright, 22, of Ewing, a passenger in an automobile that figured in an auto-truck crash near Clearwater Friday night, died early Monday in a Norfolk hospital. He suffered a skull fracture, jaw and neck injuries and did not regain consciousness after the accident.

Clarence Schmeizer, 26, of Ewing, driver of the car, was released from the same hospital Sunday. He suffered cuts and bruises.

Schmeizer, Wright and Wright's brother, Charles, were in the automobile when the accident occurred near a filling station on highway 275 at Clearwater. The truck was operated by Darold May, of O'Neill.

According to Patrolman Eugene Schlegel, of the safety patrol, just before the accident May had stopped the truck to let two passengers get out. When the truck was starting, the Schmeizer car, coming fast from the east, struck it.

Impact Smashes Truck

The impact caved in the side of the truck, the patrolman reported. Both machines were extensively damaged.

Charles Wright suffered a hand injury. May, the truck driver,

was uninjured. The passengers who had alighted from the truck were Mr. and Mrs. Martin Jaeger, of Clearwater.

Patrolman Schlegel, enroute to Norfolk from Ainsworth, arrived at the scene of the accident one minute after it happened.

Ewing Girl Injured; Car Strikes Tree

EWING—A 15-year-old Ewing high school sophomore, Miss Norma Jean Latzel, is in an Orchard hospital suffering from fractures of her jaw and right kneecap and the loss of both upper and lower front teeth as a result of an automobile accident early Friday between Ewing and Page.

Miss Latzel was riding in a car with John Harriman, of Clearwater, when the machine struck loose gravel, plunged into a ditch and struck a tree.

They were enroute from Ewing to Page, and were admitted to the Orchard hospital at 2:30 a.m.

21 Housing Priorities Filed by O'Neill Vets

Nebraska's November quota of priorities for building or creating housing units for World War II veterans is 510, according to an announcement by the Federal Housing Administration.

Up to October 1, priorities have been issued in this section as follows: O'Neill, 21; Norfolk, 30; Ainsworth, 29; Valentine, 28; Plainview, 12; Atkinson, 10.

Maximum FHA-insured loan limits are as follows: Single family (three-bedroom house with garage), \$8,100; single family (without garage), \$7,950; single family (two-bedroom house with garage), \$7,500.

Maximum term is 25 years.

Accident Rate Ups with Mercury Drop, Safety Head Warns

Warning that highway accidents go up as the temperature goes down, Capt. C. J. Sanders, of the Nebraska state safety patrol, urges that auto owners and truck fleet operators prepare now for safe winter driving.

"In addition to all other accidents, there were nearly 1,000 accidents recorded during Nebraska's 'mild' winter last year that could be attributed to icy or snowy roads," Sanders said. "Thirteen deaths resulted from accidents under those conditions."

Drivers must recognize the added hazards which make safe winter driving difficult, he continued.

"Stop and go traction is greatly reduced on snow or ice, with either new or old tire treads. Synthetic rubber tires, now about equal to natural rubber for wear and stopping on dry pavement, do not provide as good traction on snow and ice as did prewar natural rubber.

"Visibility is cut down by frost or snow on windshields and car windows, and by the longer hours of darkness.

"With thousands of over-age vehicles in use, it is imperative that sincere attention be given to safety features as well as the customary mechanical check-ups, oil change, or anti-freeze."

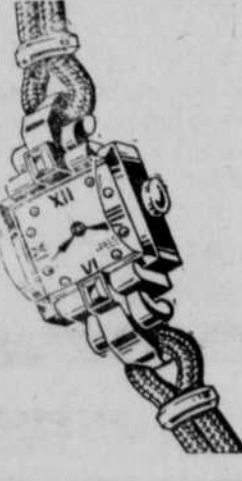
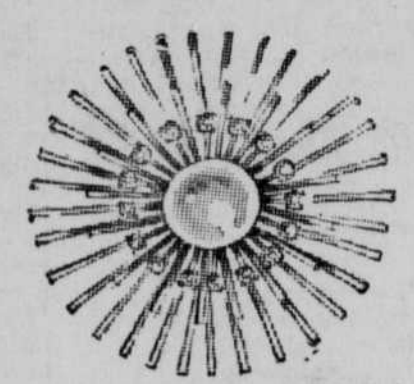
