Accident Rate Ups with Mercury Drop, Safety Head Warns

Warning that highway accidents go up as the temperature goes down, Capt. C J. Sanders, of the Nebraska state safety patrol, urges that auto owners and truck fleet operators prepare now for safe winter driving.

"In addition to all other accidents, there were nearly 1,000 accidents recorded during Nebras-ka's "mild" winter last year that could be attributed to icy or snowy roads." Sanders said. "Thirteen deaths resulted from accidents under those conditions."

Drivers must recognize the added hazards which make safe winter driving difficult, he continued.




