ELGIN-OAKDALE POWER LINK MADE

Better Norfolk - O'Neill Service Seen with 2-Way System

A new high-tension electric transmission line, recently constructed between Elgin and Oakdale, now provides a two-way source of power for all towns served by Consumers Public Power district between Norfolk and O'Neill. The new line was energized October 28, according to an announcement issued Monday by the Norfolk office.

The new line will assure patrons of "more dependable service in the 'in-between' towns," H. L. Carson, of Norfolk, Consumers district manager, said.

Previously, service interruptions occurred frequently with the one-way service. With the "loop" completed, in the event of a power failure on one end of the line, power can be "switched in" to each town from the opposite end. Both Norfolk and O'Neill are strategic points in the Consumers network.

The transmission line between Norfolk and Oakdale has been rebuilt, increasing the capacity of the line from 16,500-volts to 22,000-volts, and a new substation has been built at Norfolk to meet the new requirements.

Mr. Carson explained that the poles on the Elgin-Oakdale link were set during the past summer, but delays in procuring wire prevented earlier completion of the

line. He said that a "marked improvement" in electric service in the area should result from the newly-constructed line.

Other Consumers' plans in this territory include the construction of a new high-voltage line between Norfolk and O'Neill direct, and rebuilding of the line between Belden and O'Neill. This expansion is calculated to further improve service in the entire area from Norfolk to the western extremities of the line at Valentine.

Help Shortages in Nurseries Reduce '47 Tree Seedlings

County Agent A. Neil Dawes reports that the supply of trees available to people this year will be much below that of last year, both through the Clarke-McNary forestry fund and through the Holt county soil conservation district. This is due in part to the wartime labor shortages in the nurseries, thus preventing the planting and care of the usual number of seedlings.

Farmers and ranchers wishing to plant trees next year are urged to get their orders in at once through the county agent's office for the Clarke-McNary trees. The price is \$1.25 per hundred. There will be a limit of 1,000 red cedars per order. Other varieties available are Russian mulberry, American elm, Chinese elm, green ash, honeylocust, black locust, cottonwood, Russian olive, caragana, soft maple, Ponderosa, and jack pine. Trees will be shipped directly to the farmer in early

April. Application blanks may be secured by writing or contacting the county agent's office.

"Every farm and ranch should have a windbreak planting, as well as cedar trees around the

buildings, to protect and beautify the home," Dawes explained. "Holt countyans in the past have ordered many trees, and orders should be placed early before the supply is exhausted."
