 O'Neill, Nebraska, October 30, 1946.
 Holt County Board of Supervisors met as per adjournment. All members present.

Meeting called to order by the Chairman.

Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.
 Motion by Wulf, that after the termination of their lease at the Annex, Nov. 15, 1946, the United States Employment Service be permitted to use the Assembly Room at the Court House as an Office the days they are in O'Neill. Carried.

Motion by Collins, seconded by Wulf, that they rent the room in the Annex recently vacated by the Employment Service to the Soil Conservation Service at the rate of \$12.50 per month, payable monthly.

The Petition of Ralph Eaker of Ewing, Nebraska, for a Tax Refund was taken up at this time. Motion was made by Wulf, seconded by Stein that the prayer of the Petitioner be granted and a refund issued him in the amount of \$81.77.

Motion was made by Hubbard, seconded by Clark that the County Attorney be instructed to start Condemnation Proceedings on the Real Property for the proposed Van Horn road.

A petition signed by Clarence Ernst and 28 other interested persons was read at this time. They were petitioning to have the road commencing at Northwest corner of Section 30, Township 29, Range 13, running 3 miles west along North side of Sections 25, 26 and 27, Twp. 29, Range 12, thence north 1 mile between Sections 21 and 22, Twp. 29, Range 12, to connect with County Road at the junction of U. S. Highway No. 20, designated a County Road.

Motion was made by Collins, seconded by Clark that a Hearing on this petition be held by the Holt County Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, November 26, 1946, at 2:00 P.M. at their office in the Court House. Motion carried.
