**PRAIRIELAND** ... TALK

**LINCOLN**—It's a dull season when the state capital crowd hasn't something to talk about. Just now it's the penitentiary, Warden Olsen having been removed by action of the board of control on January 3.

The matter of auditing the records, some "inside" transactions and alleged "insolence" on the part of the deposed warden account for his removal. Now Olsen proposes to fight it out. Defending his "rights" is a primitive instinct, but to graciously bow to the inevitable is always characteristic of the gentleman. Why should one crave the job of warden of a penitentiary or senator from Mississippi when he might have serene living out on prairie-land?

The game commission is another statehouse group that seeks to enlarge its horizon, dividing the commonwealth into 21 districts instead of 14 as at present, and adding seven more to the staff of officers. Probably birds and beasts for the sportsman's gun is the least important of Nebraska resources and the functions of the commission touches the interests of a small percent of the population.

The wind whistles out of the arctic circle today. Snow whirls, hesitates, and settles to the cold concrete and is swept into drifts along the pavement curb. The nude arms of the trees reach out in gray gloom. Summer's green, perpetual on cedar and pine, stands in dark outline above the fallen snow. A thrifty housewife, clad as an Eskimo, goes by with a bag of groceries. Town folks live from paper sacks. A block away the scene fades to a dull mass floating before the storm. It is winter. December frosts, January snows brew in earth's mysterious laboratory the elements to impart a pink glow to the rose of June, the flavor to garden and orchard bounties.

*"All beautiful the march of days,  
As seasons come and go;  
The hand that shaped the rose hath wrought  
The crystal of the snow,  
Hath sent the hoary frost of heaven,  
The flowing waters sealed,  
And laid a silent loveliness  
On hill and wood and field."*
