Photographers Take Money and Fail To Make Pictures

Two men who registered last week at the Logan Hotel as Johnny Sharp and Guy Reed, and who solicited and received \$1.00 each from about thirty-five Elgin people, for photos which were to be taken on Monday of this week at the hotel, left Sunday and failed to put in their appearance on Monday morning. It is alleged that they gave their customers in Albion similar treatment before coming to Elgin.

Driving a late model Chrysler car with a Wyoming license reported as 14-83, the two men told that they represented a firm in Cheyenne. The receipts were marked non-refundable.

On Monday they called Harry Campbell from O'Neill and told him they would be unable to take the pictures in Elgin and for those who had made a down payment to send their receipts to Cheyenne. However, there were two different kinds of receipts. They also told Campbell that they were sending a money order for their hotel bill which he has not yet received. It is understood that they also left an unpaid bill with one of the local garages.

Nebraska's Well-Regulated Taverns

Why is the selling of beer in Nebraska usually as clean and law-abiding as the selling of other products through retail stores?

One reason is the Nebraska Committee of the U. S. Brewing Foundation. This Committee maintains an active program of education to help all beer retailers operate in such a way that they are a real credit to their communities.

Cooperating with law enforcement agencies, the Committee insists that the Nebraska liquor control laws be upheld. When a violation is observed, a letter of caution goes to the retailer. In the few cases that a retailer persists in operating to the discredit of the industry and against the public welfare, appropriate action is sought through legal authorities.

These activities steadily raise Nebraska tavern conditions.
