MRS. HARRY FOX TAKEN BY DEATH

Dies at Farm Home 18 Miles Northeast of O'Neill

Death claimed the life Saturday of Mrs. Harry Fox, 72, a longtime resident of northeast Holt county. She died at 11:40 a.m. following a 10-months' illness.

Mrs. Fox was the widow of the late Harry Fox, who homesteaded here in 1904. Mr. Fox died on November 26, 1941.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Pleasant Valley church with Rev. E. A. Anderson officiating. Burial was in the Pleasant Valley cemetery. The pallbearers were Axel Borg, Fred Lindberg, J. P. Jones, Edward Hood, Adolph Sedivy, William Devall, Frank Nelson and Henry Kreier.

Alice Cyruscia Hall was born on November 30, 1874, at Austin, Minn., a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel W. Hall, both of whom were natives of New England.

On November 30, 1899, she became the bride of Harry Fox. The ceremony took place at Elk Point, S. D. The couple came to Holt county from Denver, Colo., in 1904, settling on a homestead in the Redbird-Meek vicinities.

For a number of years they operated a store at Meek. Survivors include her only son, Charles W. Fox.

LARGEST SOIL DISTRICT OKAYED

Brown, Keya Paha, Rock Farmers Register Approval at Polls

Nebraska's 77th and largest soil conservation district was voted in last week at Springview, Bassett, and Ainsworth. By a vote of 166 votes "for" and 11 votes "against" the formation of the district was favored by 95 percent of the farmers and ranchers in Brown, Keya Paha, and Rock counties.

The district will encompass all of the three counties and will be known as the "K-B-R soil conservation district." The largest soil conservation district in Nebraska, it is also one of the largest in the United States.

Of the ballots cast in the election, 103 were direct vote and 74 mail vote. Only one voter appearing at the polling places voted against the district; while 10 of the mail ballots were opposed.

An election will be held soon to determine the four supervisors who will have charge of the new soil district.

FARM INCOME FAR EXCEEDS 1945

26.3 Percent Higher for 1946; Operating Costs Also Up

Nebraska's farm income totaled \$899,710,000 for 1946, \$171,710,000 above the 1945 figure, figures released Friday by the state department of agriculture disclose.

Livestock and livestock products accounted for 64.5 percent, or \$580,896,000 of the farm income for 1946, while crops surpassed all previous recordings by bringing \$318,846,000 to Nebraska farmers last year.

Rufus M. Howard, department director, said that although farm incomes were 26.3 percent higher than 1945, expenses and operating costs had also risen.

Nebraska's farm income in 1945 was \$728,000,000. The figures were compiled from a United States department of agriculture report.
