Brown, Keya Paha, Rock Farmers Register Approval at Polls

Nebraska's 77th and largest soil conservation district was voted in last week at Springview, Bassett, and Ainsworth. By a vote of 166 rotes "for" and 11 votes "against" the formation of the district was favored by 95 percent of the farmers and ranchers in Brown, Keya Paha, and Rock counties.

The district will encompass all of the three counties and will be known as the "K-B-R soil conservation district." The largest soil conservation district in Nebraska, it is also one of the largest in the United States.

Of the ballots cast in the elecion, 103 were direct vote and 74 mail vote. Only one voter appearing at the polling places voted against the district; while 10 of the mail ballots were opposed. An election will be held soon to determine the four supervisors


