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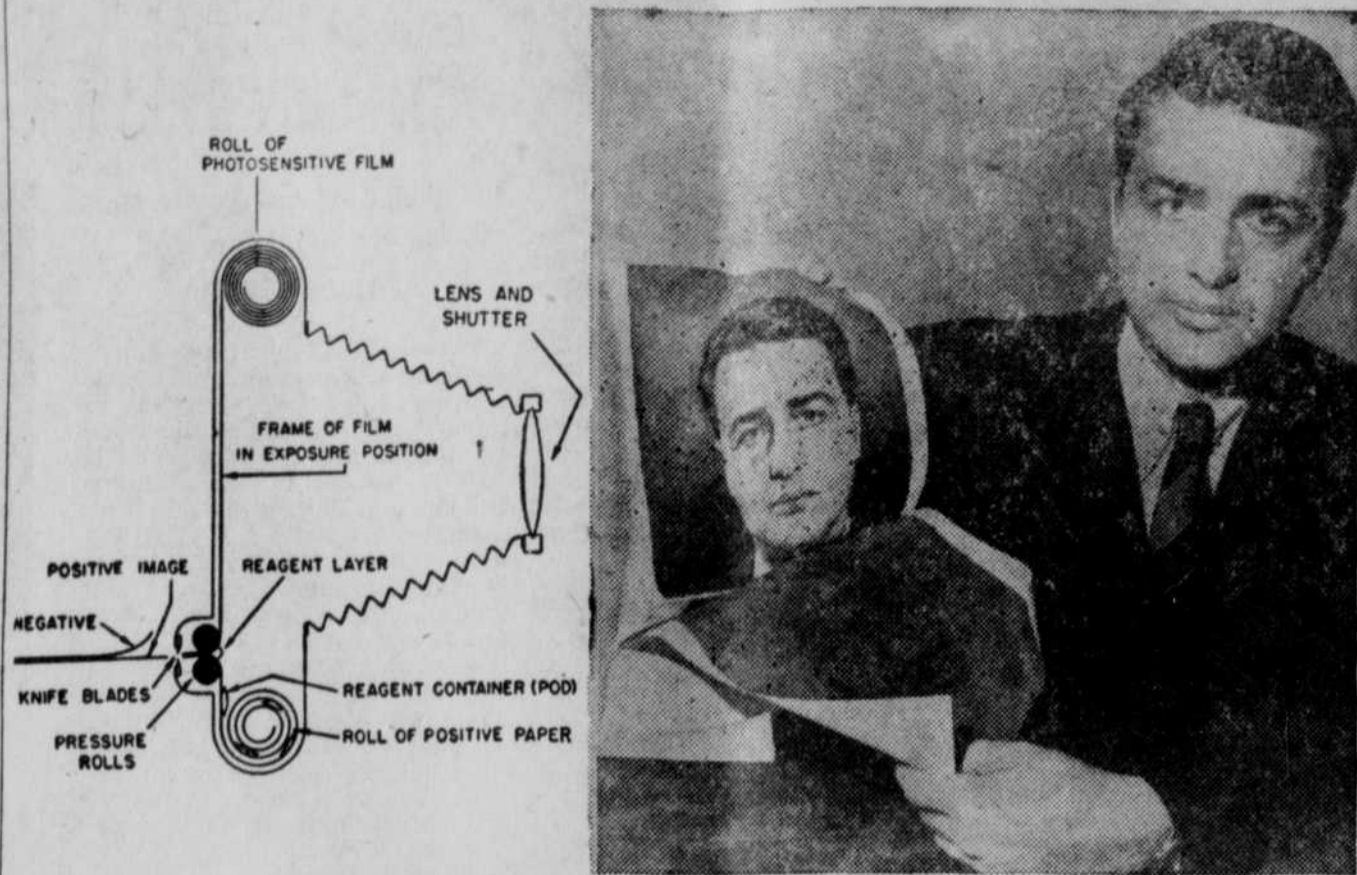

Edwin H. Land, New York City, shows a positive print and negative just taken from the new camera that delivers a finished print in just 60 seconds from the moment it is snapped. The camera itself is an orthodox one, the secret being in the attachment to the

back, which can be adapted to any camera. The attachment accommodates a roll of printing paper in addition to the regular film. As the film is wound to the next frame after exposure, film and printing paper are brought into contact. Between them is a tiny sealed

container of developing and fixing chemical. Pressure of the roller breaks this container and spreads the chemical evenly on the paper. Development and fixing are complete in one minute.
