Telephone Wages ARE GOOD
No Strike is Justified

Telephone people are paid better than is generally paid for similar skills in each community.

Telephone people have had six general wage increases since 1941, representing an average increase of over 75% in wage rates, which is considerably greater than the increase in living costs.

Telephone people have good working conditions. Their work is steady and they have 6 holidays and 1, 2 and 3 weeks vacations each year with pay, depending on the length of service.

Telephone people also have sickness benefits and pensions, with all costs paid by the Company.

The Company wants to be fair to its personnel, but it also feels that it should be fair to those who use the service and who in the final analysis, pay the wage bill.

The Union is demanding increases in wages of from \$12 a week to as high as \$35 a week, which would result in an average increase of \$17.10 a week or an increase of 42½ cents an hour for all employees of the Company represented by the Union.

Union demands total \$30,000,000 a year. This is equivalent to an average increase of \$2 a month for every telephone, including extensions.
