Helen June Asher Weds in Tiajuana

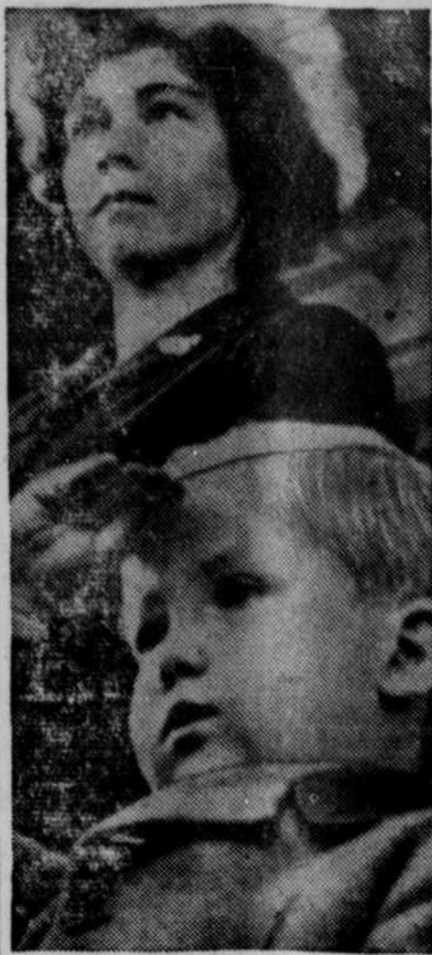
