Charles Shatto arrived Tuesday from Denver, Colo., to stay a few days with his wife and the John Carr family.

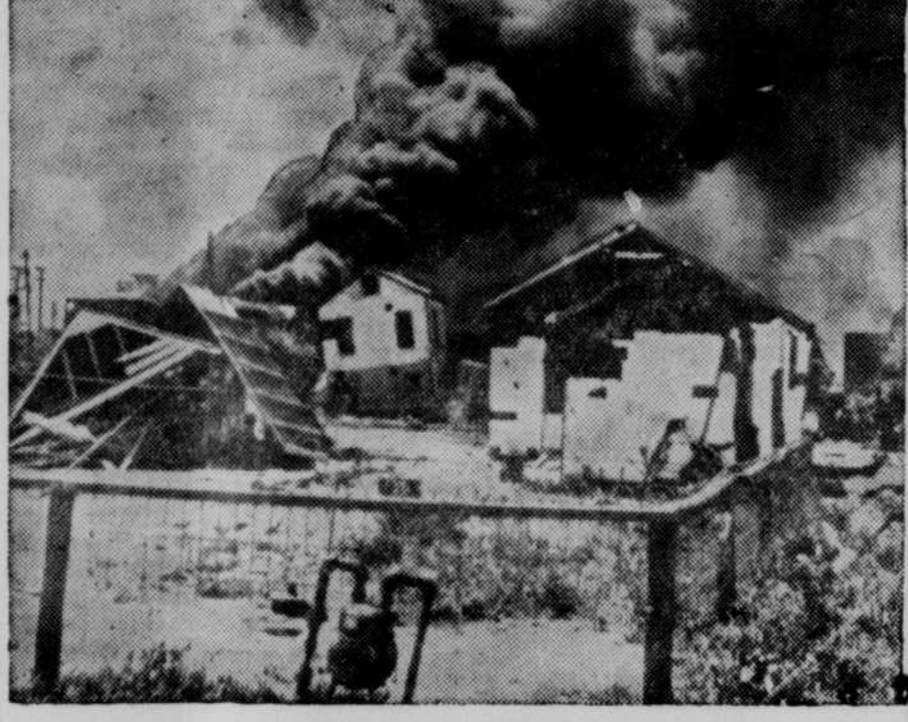
