7 Top Awards Won in National Prep Contest at St. Joseph

Twenty-three O'Neill music pupils, competing Saturday in the midwest division of the national high school music contest av St. Joseph, Mo., captured one "highly superior" rating and six "superior" ratings in a field of 2,300 contestants representing nine states.


