June Byers, Evelyn Wall Expected to Fill House Here Next Thursday

PESEK TO RETURN

A couple of gals will headline the wrestling program number two to be sponsored by the American Legion post here next Thursday evening.

So well was the March 13 program received, despite the much-talked-about snafu of the great John Pesek, the Legionnaires have set-up a mixed card for the May 22 customers.

June Byers, of Houston, Tex., a 155-pound cutie, will go against Evelyn Wall, of Los Angeles, Calif., who will weigh in at 148 pounds. Their main event, tangle will go two-falls-out-of-three with a 90-minute time limit.

The semiwindup will feature the illustrious John, who failed

to show on March 13 when he was scheduled for the main event. A temporary ruling from the state boxing commission denied the 53-year-old wrestling great the right to perform in Nebraska and jeopardized his standing in at least 34 other states. Big John came to O'Neill, patched things up, and his sponsors here say he'll move a mountain to avoid another snafu with the O'Neill Legion.

John will tackle Danny Pelch, a 240-pound Omaha Greek-American, in the semiwindup, which is booked for two-out-of-three with a 90-minute limit.

For the special event, Ed Kruml, 225-pound grappler from down Ericson way, will entertain Red Vagnone, of Columbus, O., a 228-pounder.

Pat McGill, who officiated in the March 13 exhibition, will return for the refereeing chores.

The first match will be at 8:30 p. m.

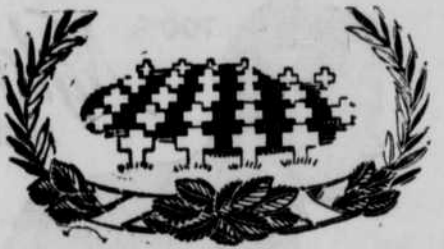

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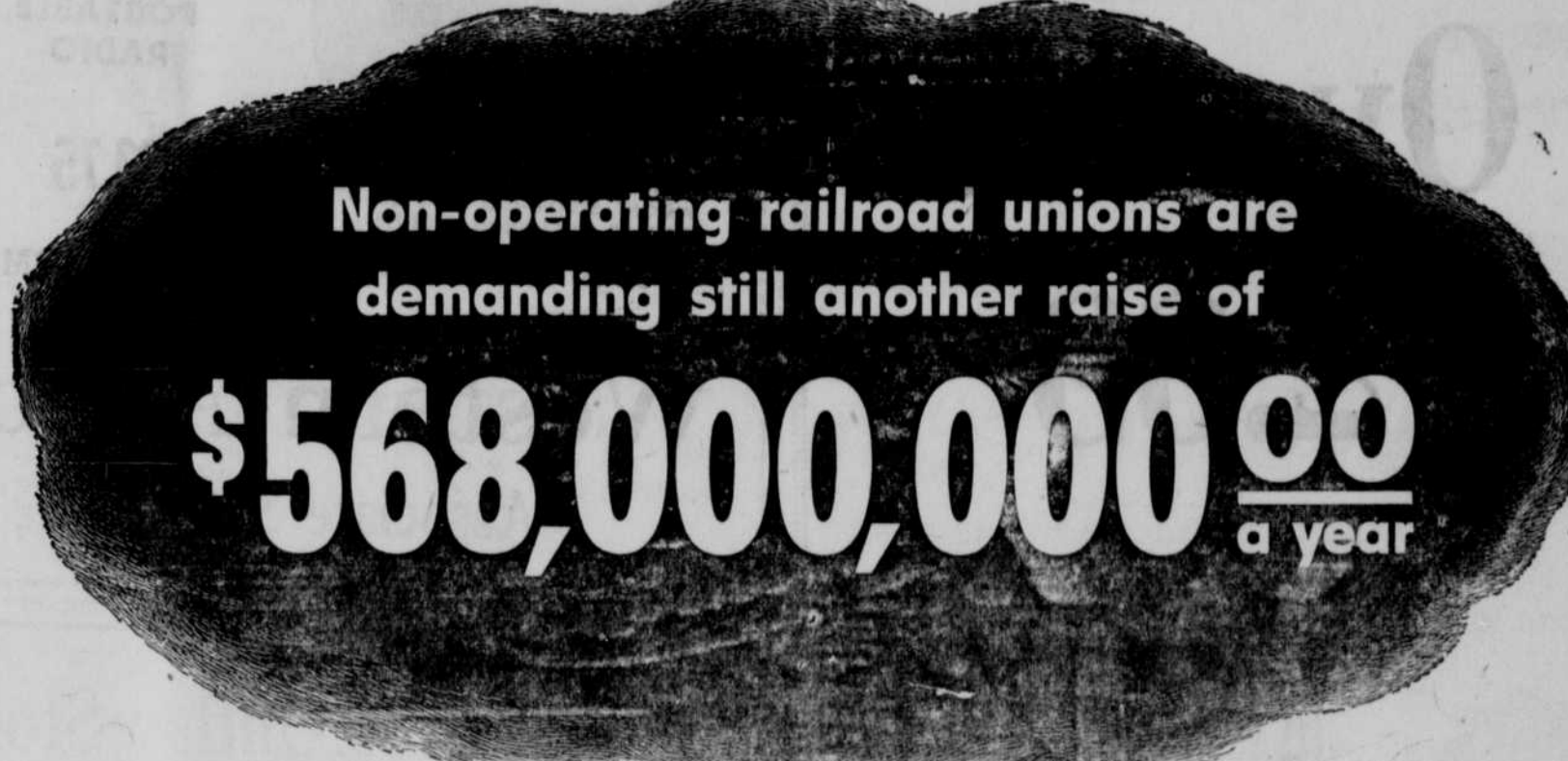


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Non-operating railroad unions are demanding still another raise of

The non-operating unions alone—whose members do not actually operate trains—are demanding a flat increase of 20 cents an hour. These demands would cost the railroads of the country five hundred sixty-eight million dollars a year!

Last year these employees had an increase of 18½ cents an hour. This was their third major wage increase since 1939. Their average weekly pay has gone up 75%, as against a cost-of-living rise of 54%.

—special payroll taxes on railroads have recently been increased;

—and passenger traffic has declined.
