

Auxiliary Hopes to Sell 1,500 Flowers on Poppy Day

Saturday, May 24, will be poppy day in O'Neill and throughout the United States. Mrs. John Davidson, president of Simonson unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, reminded O'Neillites today (Thursday). The Auxiliary officials hope to sell at least 1,500 poppies here.

"On that day everyone will be asked to wear a memorial poppy in honor of the dead of the two world wars and to make a contribution for the welfare of the disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead," she explained.

Volunteers from the Auxiliary and young women's groups of the city will distribute the flowers on the streets. Mrs. Dean Streeter, poppy chairman of the Auxiliary, will be in charge. Plans are being made to cover the city completely so that everyone

will have an opportunity to honor the war dead and aid the living victims of the two conflicts.

"The Saturday before Memorial day has been observed as poppy day in all parts of the country for many years," said Mrs. Davidson. "Poppies have been worn in memory of the war dead ever since the close of World War I. They are replicas of the wild flowers which grew on the battle fields of France and Belgium."

"The poppies which the Auxiliary will distribute are all hand-made, shaped from crepe paper by disabled veterans working in the Veteran's hospital at Lincoln."

\$1,200 SOUGHT FOR SCOUTING

City's Estimated Share in Six County Drive

A number of O'Neill citizens, under the leadership of Judge D. R. Mounts and J. E. Davis, are beginning to canvas the community for the purpose of helping raise sufficient funds to carry out an extensive Boy Scout program in Holt county.

Leaders and friends of the Scout movement are conducting simultaneous campaigns in Cherry, Boyd, Rock, Brown, and Keya Paha counties and in other communities in Holt. The goal for the six counties is \$5,000, and the goal in the O'Neill community is \$1,200.

These funds will be expended mainly in the employment of a full-time field executive who will be a member of the staff of the Covered Wagon area council. This sum will include the field executive's salary, travel expenses and program. As a full-time professional worker, it is intended that he will devote his time to the organization of new units, the servicing of present units, the training of leaders, and the directing of camping programs and other activities.

Both Judge Mounts, who is district chairman of the fund-raising campaign, and Mr. Davis, who is the financial chairman of the O'Neill drive, have expressed hope that both rural and urban folks will support this campaign. "Three out of every four boys, both in cities and on farms, want to be Scouts," they say, according to a recent national survey.

"These boys should be given the opportunity to join the ranks of Scouting along with two million other boys who are now in the work, and a special effort will be made to reach those living on farms and ranches."

Regarding the question of how much a person should give, Mr. Davis said: "Give what you think the boys of your community are worth. Give as much as you can; not as little as you may. You have to pay taxes for other community improvements and services, so why not make your 'heart taxes'—your voluntary support of community improvements and investments for better citizenship—as liberal as you can?"

"During May 21-24 a friend of yours, who is familiar with the program of Scouting, will call upon you for the purpose of securing your contribution," Mr. Davis concluded.
