Smith Boys Here—

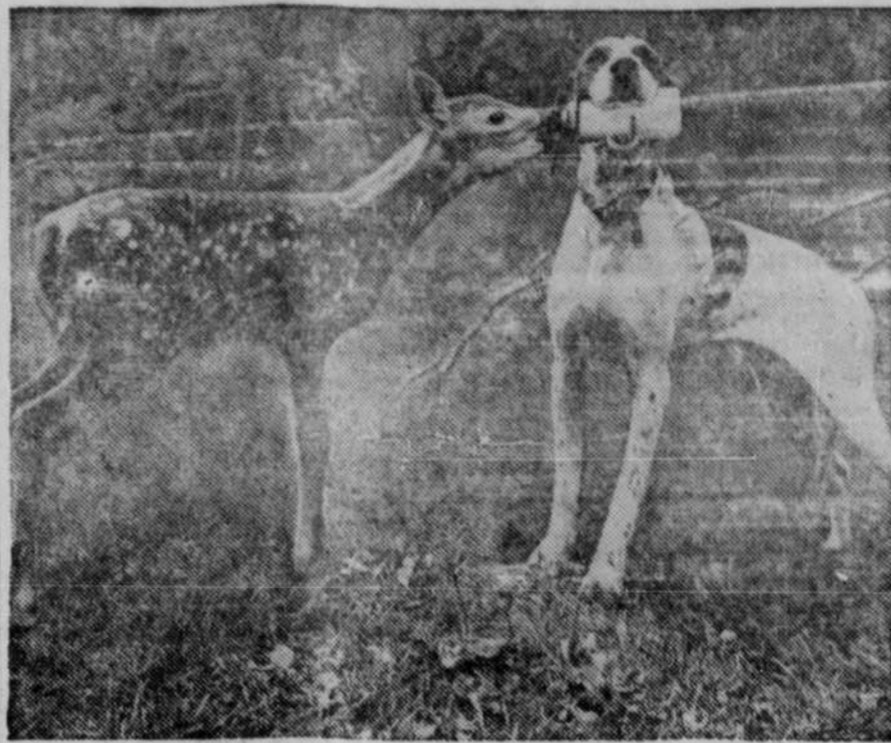
