PAGE—Funeral services were held Sunday in the high school auditorium at Ewing for Miss Una Borden, 47, who died June 18 at the telephone office in Page, where she had been operator for the past year. Rev. E. G. Whale, pastor of the Methodist church at Ewing, officiated and burial was in the Ewing cemetery.

Miss Borden died suddenly and her body was discovered by a friend. The pallbearers were Louis Bartos, Leonard Miller, William Sorensen and Laurence Haynes, all of Page; Everette Ruby, Jay Butler, Elmer Bergstrom and Andrew Wilke, all of Ewing. The auditorium was filled with numerous floral tributes. Una Borden was born at Ewing on March 17, 1900. She was reared in the Ewing community where she served as telephone operator before working at Orchard and Page. She was a member of the Ewing Methodist church.

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. F. C. Cashett, of Ewing; two brothers, Kenneth, of Omaha, and Eldon, of Hastings; 15 nieces and nephews. Her parents preceded her in death.

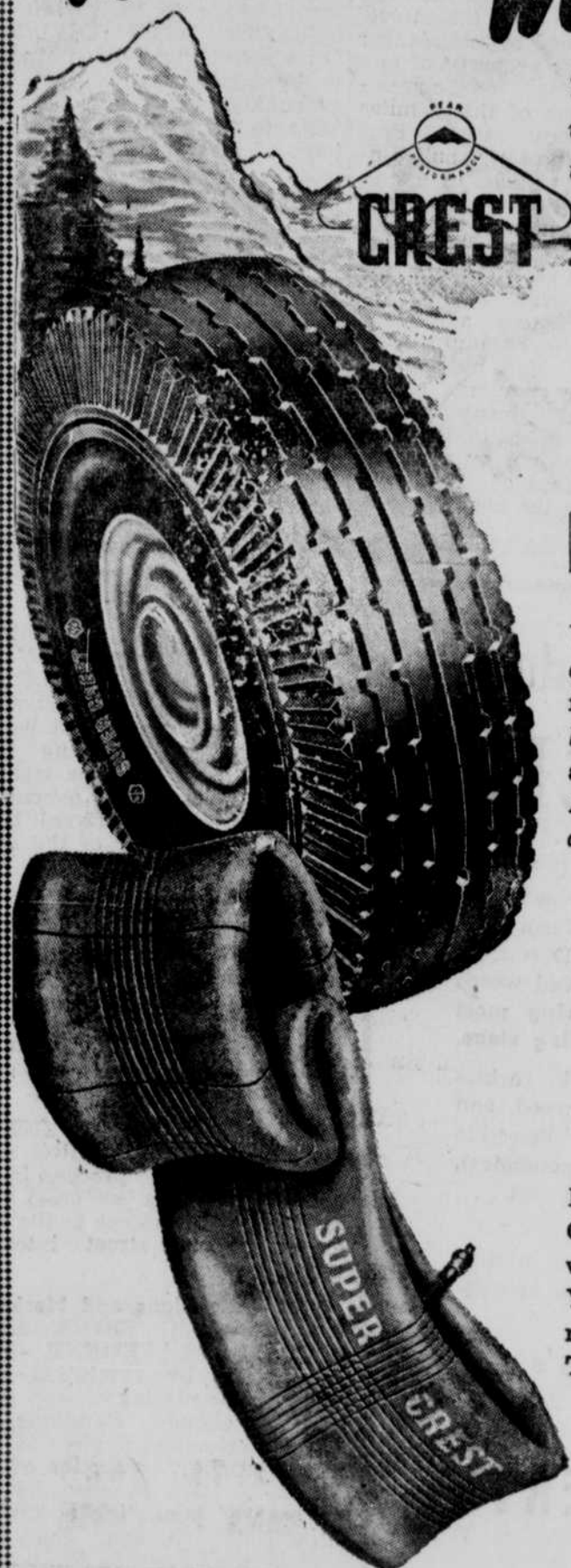
