

Friday's Legion Boxing Show Is Postponed

Flood Conditions Force Decision; July Date Seen

The 30 rounds of amateur boxing, scheduled here Friday night under the sponsorship of the American Legion, have been postponed, it was announced today (Thursday) by Don Enright and Stub Sullivan, who are in charge of arrangements.

They explained that flood conditions would restrict attendance and the Legion decided to postpone the show until later. "It is hoped to set-up the same program in July," Enright said.

Two Omaha boxing teams, representing the American Legion post No. 1 and the North Side Athletic club, were scheduled for the O'Neill program. Both teams are studded with fighters who have won Golden Gloves titles. The North Side is composed largely of Negroes.

The Legion spokesmen explained that those persons who have already purchased tickets may have their ducats redeemed at the point of purchase, or they will be honored at the boxing show when it is staged on a date to be announced.
