

HEAVY RAINS TEST CONTOUR

D. B. Marcellus Says Conservation Practice Proves Itself

ATKINSON—"Our contouring has been really tested by our recent rains, and given satisfactory results," reports D. B. Marcellus, who resides eight miles north and three miles west of Atkinson. He is a cooperator with the Holt soil conservation district.

"I wouldn't go back to the old straight-furrow farming again even if we do dread doing some of the farming operations," Marcellus continued. "I sure would recommend it to any farmer who farms on sloping or hilly land."

In reporting on his results, Marcellus stated that "yields have been better and we are holding the soil on the field. The only washing we have had was at the end of the rows where the excess water spilled out. This is going to be eliminated by diverting the water into grass."

Contouring is only one of the conservation practices included in the conservation plan which Marcellus worked out with the help of soil conservation service personnel assisting the Holt district. Other conservation measures which are included are seeding grass on cropland for pasture, crop residue management, planting field shelter-belts, and reclamation of swamp area.

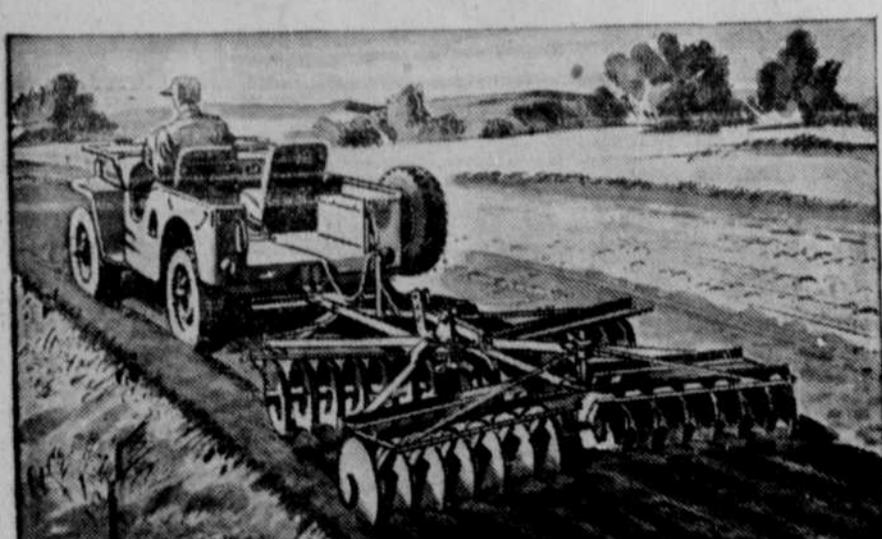
