# That was like ROY WALKER...

**MORE OR LESS PERSONAL**  
*A Chat with the Editor*  
 Now I'll show you what I meant when I said the other day that you readers could help put this column together if you wanted to.

A fellow I'd never seen before or heard of came in with a copy of the evening Journal that told of the death of Roy Walker, 48 year old lineman for Consumers Power district who was electrocuted just two years almost to the day after he had barely missed death in a similar accident. "I wish you'd write a piece about Roy," this fellow said. "He didn't build up anything much for himself in money or position," he went on, "but he spent his entire lifetime doing things for other people. I thought you'd like to know."

"There was nobody Roy wouldn't do anything for if he could find a way to do it at all. That guy I'll tell you, he made a full-time occupation of doing good. For years, as far as anyone between Hickman and Lincoln knew, he was THE light company, if you know what that means."

Whether you had a chicken coming along and a brooder house needing repair, Roy'd get it fixed. I know because he saved a batch of chickens for me. Roy came out after quitting time and fixed the brooder, and what do you think he charged? Five dollars? Nope, fifty cents.

"If a farmer's milking machine broke down, he'd come out and put it in shape had to be done. If it was the basketball team needed new suits, Roy would subscribe the money. There were hundreds of little things would come up, and if no one could think of any way to get them done, it was always up to Roy Walker. Or take it anyone was sick or in trouble, Roy was always there to help him."

"No sir, he was not a big man, that's why maybe you wouldn't want to write about him. He belonged to few clubs. He wasn't what you'd call wealthy. There was nothing he'd made him great. Just Roy Walker. Why, he'd spend a week finding a plate for your electric stove if you couldn't get one yourself—and I don't suppose it benefited him or the company much."

"And by the way, that fellow was a fisherman. He could sit down in the middle of twenty-five people who wasn't getting a nibble, and pull out four-pound catfish all day long."

"And you know, there wasn't a fire but what Roy'd be there and cut the wires almost before the firemen. Most always you'd see the fire truck and Roy arrive at the same time."

"Now I'll tell you the difference between him and most people. You take you and me, we'll stop our car and pull a guy out of the mud if we can see there's a way to do it without getting dirty. But Roy, he'd go out of his way 24 hours out of every day if there was just anything he could do anything for. It was just what he did. I'll tell you what Don't take my word for it. Just call anyone between College View and Hickman. Go down the phone book and pick out the four. Take any twenty-five names you know just cold like that what they don't tell you what I've just said—and list completely."

"Well, thanks, fellow. I didn't mean to take so much of your time. Just thought you might like to write now and then about folks who hadn't done much—in a news way."

And there, you see, I've got the column done. About a fellow who hadn't done much, except the only thing that counts, I tried that telephoning down the "four's," and nobody's being scratched off my list.
