## C. J. Gatz Is the Owner; C. E. Melina, Building Contractor

C. J. (Boy) Gatz, a native of Weill and a son of real Holt county pioneer stock, is owner of the building which houses Gambles new O'Neill store. On January 1, 1946, the project was begun under the direction of C. E. Melina, also of O'Nell, the Luilding contractor.

Mr. Gatz and Mr. Melina have been confronted with many problems in bui'ding the \$30,000 structure during a trying 18 months. They say it would have been easier to build a dozen buildings of the same type during a normal year. They traveled uncounted miles to procure materials that were scarce, and Mr. Melina made one trip to New York City to buy steel girders alone!




