In 1891 the Worth family moved to Wayne county, and later spent five years in Scotts-Bluff county, returning to Holt in 1931.

After the death of his wife in January, 1936, the late Mr. Worth made his home with Mrs. Karr. One daughter, Mrs. Ethel Schmidt, of Bancroft, died in 1935.

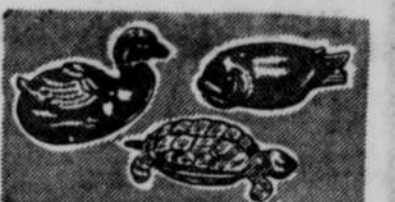

Production of new Chevrolet automobiles, trucks, and pickups in 1945, was virtually of no consequence due to conversion from war to peacetime production. However, in 1946 production, while greater than other manufacturers, was only half of what had been planned. Likewise, production for 1947 has been very disappointing and will continue to be so the balance of this year and well into 1948.

Lack of production has been brought about by labor conditions and shortages that are very acute in sheet and strip steel. Although demand for new Chevrolests is many times the demand of 1941, still production is still far below that of that year.
