### Season Opens October 18; Hours from Noon **Until Snnset**

Because Nebraska's pheasant population is down about 35 percent as compared with a year ago, the 1947 pheasant season will be a limited affair. The sea-son will be October 18 through October 27 with shooting from noon to sunset only, the state game commission decided Satur-The bag and possession day. limit will be two birds.

The scarcity of birds prompt-ed the commission to set the unusually short season and shorten both the hours of shooting and the bag and pos-session limits.

It is unlawful to shoot hen pheasants this season.

A year ago the state game commission established two sea-sons, one for the east half of the state and one for the west. The bag limit last year was five cocks and the possession limit was the same. 




