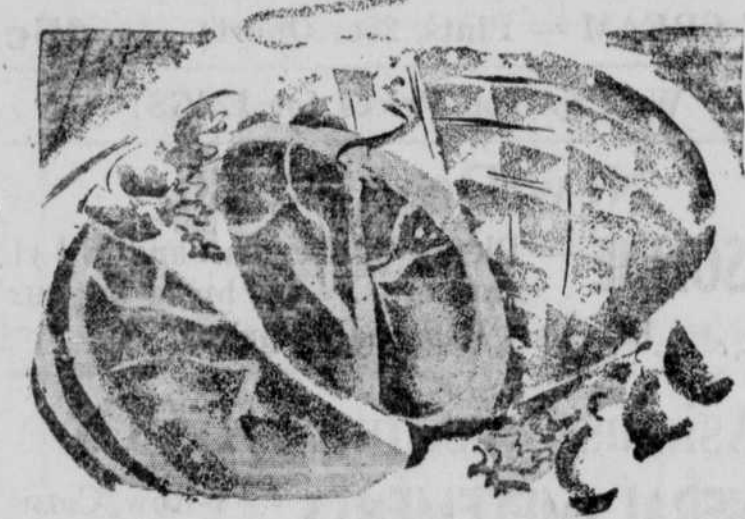
\*Nine years of beer industry self-regulation are reviewed in an annual report just issued by the Nebraska Committee.

### Rockets Have Hand in Making Second-Half Race Interesting

The O'Neill Rockets have qualified for a rather dubious honor in which they find little consolation.

On August 17 they hung on Lynch the only defeat in the second-half of the Holt-Boyd baseball league race, 5-3, and here Sunday they blasted Chambers 4-1, in the only setback for Chambers in the second-half. Although the Rockets deserve the credit for making the league race interesting, all they gained for themselves was a first-division berth.

Sunday's affair with Chambers drew a large audience on the hilltop as both clubs turned in an excellent brand of ball.

The hurling was evenly matched as Chambers' Ed Funk struck out eight while yielding 11 hits, and O'Neill's Danny Helmer set down six in allowing six hits.

O'Neill's Manager Dick Tomlinson had a perfect day at the plate with two hits in two trips. He was issued one walk in addition. Rightfielder Ivan Pruss and Catcher, Ted Tomjack, pulled doubles for O'Neill, while Manager Harry McKay, of Chambers, connected with a two-baser in his only try.

A controversy arose when Shortstop Dale Dallegge, of Chambers, took his third swing at a ball that hit the ground before it was stopped by O'Neill's catcher. The umpire, Cecil Thornton, of Chambers, signaled and called the batter out. The catcher did not bother to throw the ball to first and that is where the short-lived fuss started.

Because league rules were thrown away earlier and Chambers' own ump had ruled the batter out, the Chambers officials filed no protest.

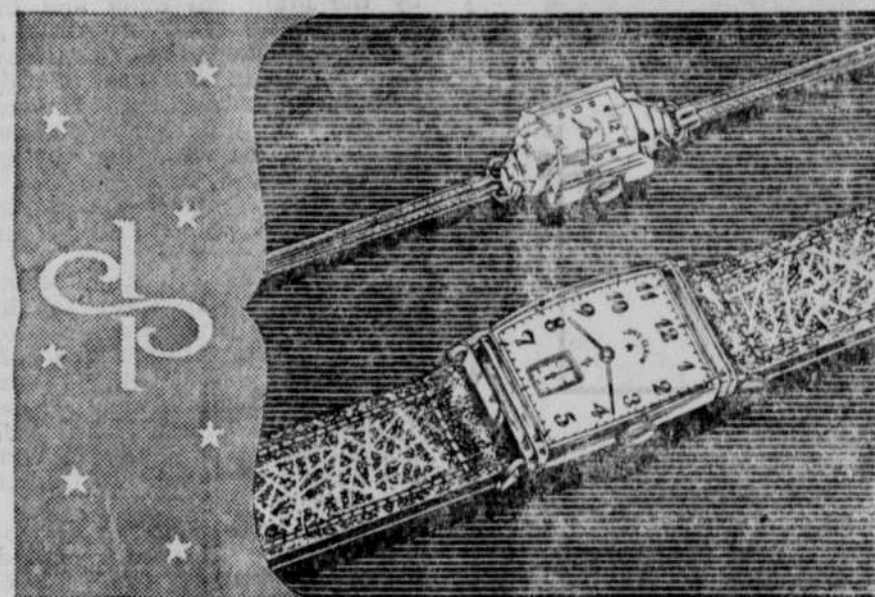
