Page Farmer, 59, Dies August 25; Burial at Norfolk

PAGE — Edward Lee Asher, 59, native of Holt county and a farmer near Page for the past 20 years, died August 25 at his home two miles northwest of here.

Funeral services were conducted Friday in the Asher home with Rev. P. J. Wirth, pastor of St. Peter's English Lutheran church at Orchard, officiating. The music was provided by St. Peter's male quartette, and interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery at Norfolk.

The late Mr. Asher was born on March 2, 1888, at Inman, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Asher. On November 8, 1931, he was married to Etta Gettman at Pierce by Rev. M. F. Scheips.

For about 12 years Mr. and Mrs. Asher made their home on a farm northeast of Page, after which they moved onto a farm, located two miles northwest of Page, which they had purchased.

Survivors include the widow; two brothers—Clinton, of Chatfield, Minn., and Neil, of Page; four sisters—Mrs. George Madson, of Norfolk; Mrs. Eva Miller, of Denver, Colo.; Mrs. Carl Davenport, of Van Nuys, Calif., and Mrs. Laura Mitchell, of El Cerrito, Calif.

His parents and five brothers preceded the late Mr. Asher in death.

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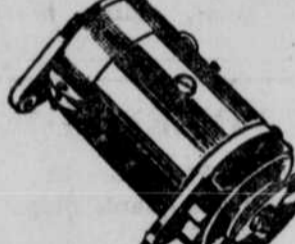
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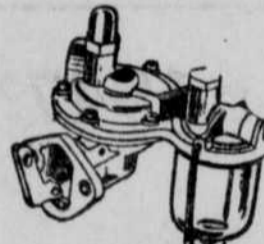
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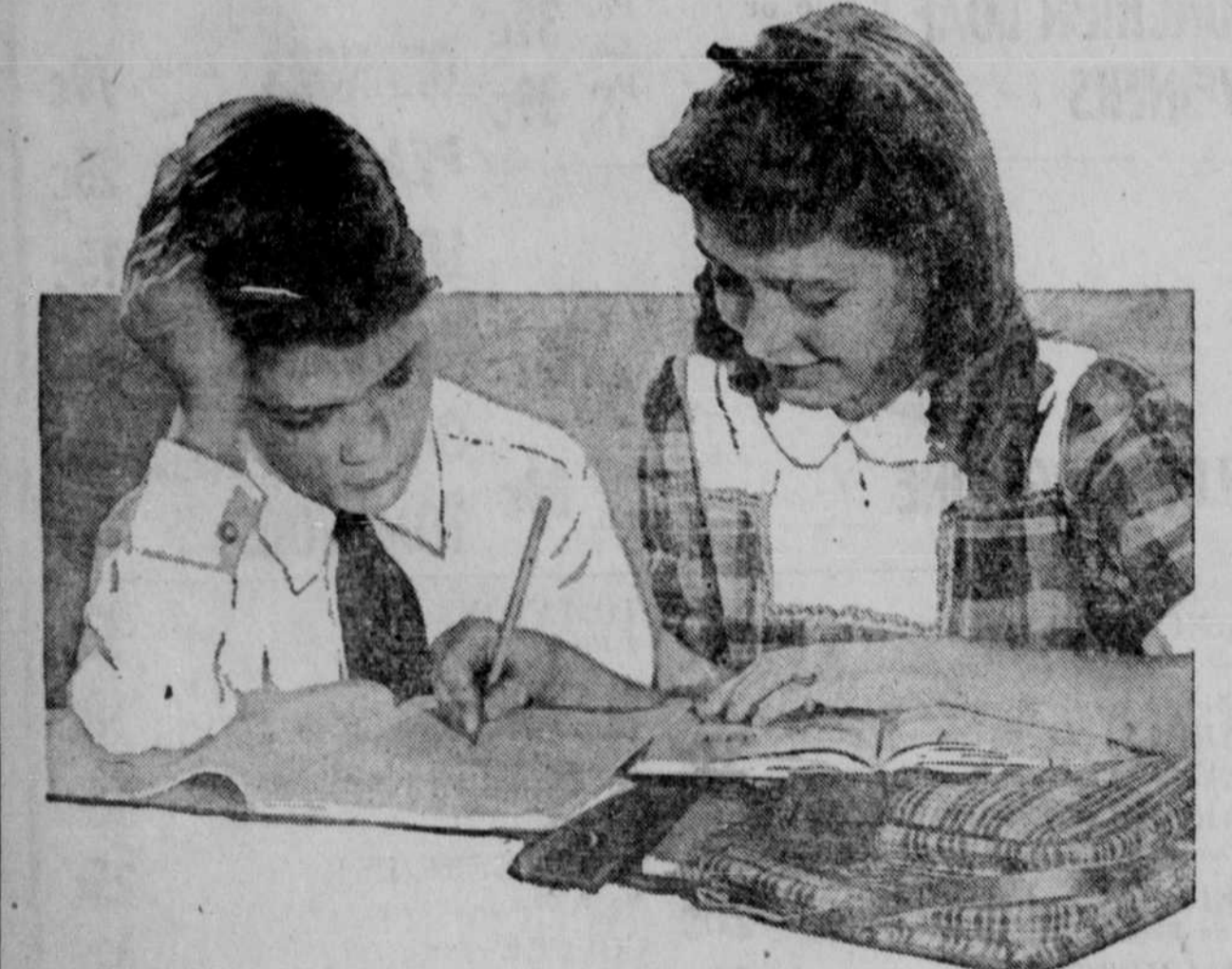
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
