60 YEARS AGO September 15, 1887

About 300 people witnessed the foot race at the fair grounds last Thursday afternoon. At 4:30 o'clock, everything being in readiness and the runners being eager to start, the word "go" was given and two contestants dashed forth. At the start, Jimmie McManus made a rush and before they were 10 feet from the starting point he was at least five feet ahead of his opponent. He did not exert himself after this, taking a nice easy gait and keeping it up all the way, coming in about four and a half feet ahead. It was a pretty race. Both men were in good condition, and as soon as they appeared on the ground the majority could pick out the winning man. Kelley is a strong, well-built man, but is not quite nimble enough with his feet. McManus, or better known as the "kid," is a dandy runner and won the admiration of all.
