Sir: I am in Minnesota now, but I walked the streets of O'Neill when they were plank sidewalks about 1882. They were R. E. Bowden's and homesteaded where I. B. Simonson now lives and we went through the dry season of 1893-'94.

As I look back at the ones gone, I counted over 300 I knew that have been called home.

I sure long to come once more but as I am not well I don't know.

Dennis Cronin sure was a man. I saw him in October before he was called. Had fine visits with him.

I sure can't forget the Irish Peellers who used to play ball. They were number 1 at it. I worked for Charles Wrede, sr., for a number of years.

When I was last in O'Neill I will say it had changed since I left there. I was coming to O'Neill day last August but I went to hospital instead. I am not able to get around much yet.

I want everyone to know I still think a lot of the ones in Nebraska. I want to send my heartfelt sorrow to those who have lost ones I knew when I left O'Neill in 1909 and hope to get so I can get there for a few days once more.

If anyone comes through Jackson, Minn., stop and see me. Ask the street commissioner where I will be found at or write. I will try and answer all letters as soon as I can.

I was looking through my album and found a picture of T. A. Simonson with a bunch of furs and the Simonsons sawing wood. It sure made me homesick for our home county.

Now to thank all for the cards received while sick and I am some better.
