Fall Vegetables Are Thrifty—

Maybe you raised them yourself and maybe you didn't, but whether you got them fresh from your garden or from the grocer's vegetable bin, you'll find they will save your pennies, and that's pretty important these days what with prices the way they are (and where aren't they high?) Carrots are reasonably priced (if anything is) and they're better than you think if you fix them well.

CARROT LOAF—Ten medium carrots, 3 eggs, beaten, 1 small onion, finely cut, 2 cups bread crumbs, 2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons butter, salt and pepper. Cook carrots in salted water, drain and mash. Add eggs and remaining ingredients, mix well. Bake in buttered baking dish, set in hot water, in a moderate oven (350 F.) for 30 minutes.

SWEET POTATO AND APPLE CASSEROLE—Lucky you if you raised your own pota-

atoes, doubly lucky if you have your own sweet potatoes and an apple orchard, but whether you do or don't this is a mighty tasty dish: 5 cups peeled, sliced sweet potatoes, 3 cups peeled, sliced apples, 3/4 cup dark corn syrup (or brown sugar), 2 tablespoons table fat, and 1 teaspoon salt. Place potatoes in bottom of 2 quart greased casserole. Cover potatoes with apples. Combine syrup, fat and salt and pour over apples. Cook covered at 350 F for 1 1/2 hours. Serves six.

To give tomato juice in a tall glass that final fillip, add a dash of celery salt or a dash of Worcestershire sauce. Mmmm—the family will go for that in a big way!

Taste Tricks You'll Want to Try—

If I do say so myself, and I do, it's the little new twist that makes for happy eating, or maybe an old twist that is new to you. Have you heard of these (and if you know some you'd share with me, send them along, won't you?) "RED HOTS", those cinnamon drops that you can buy at your candy counter will give a new flavor to home-cooked apple sauce, also a lovely pink color that you'll like. Add just enough of them to give a cinnamon flavor and fillip. Be sure to add them when you start cooking the apples so they'll have time to dissolve.

Do you know what crushed pineapple will do for old-fashioned apple sauce? Make it a brand new dish, I'm telling you—and it's delish! Add 1/2 cup crushed pineapple to a quart of apple sauce (you may can it that way, too) and no longer will your family say, "Oh shoot, apple sauce again!"

For a super-duper dessert that's no work at all, use four Graham crackers and some of that apple sauce. Put a Graham cracker on a serving dish, add a tablespoon of apple sauce, then another cracker, more apple sauce, another cracker, and a dab of apple sauce on top. If you have cream, and whip and flavor it then it's about as delicious a dish as you can ask for. Fix this just before the meal because it doesn't like waiting too long!

Purely Personal—
