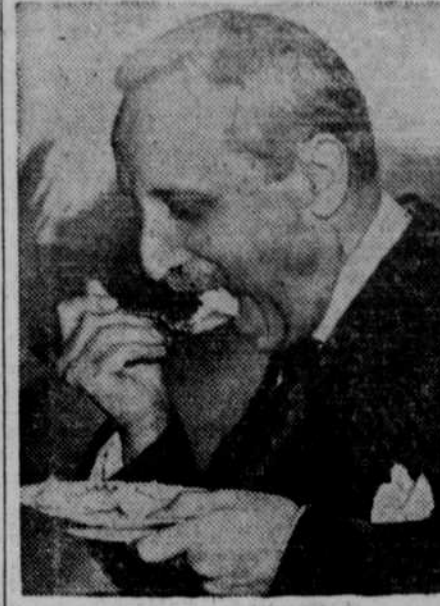
The small Frickels, Donald, Ronald and Carolyn, attended a post-Hallowe'en party at the Clarence Fockel home Monday evening.
