

Neligh Sinks O'Neill, 25 - 13, in Armistice Day Battle

Warriors' Stronger Line Spells Difference; Rice Sparkles

The Neligh Warriors found sweet revenge for a 1946 defeat by blasting the O'Neill Eagles, 25 - 13, here before a large Armistice day crowd. The match had been originally scheduled for Friday night, but was postponed because of adverse weather and field conditions.

The first-half was played on fairly even terms with each team counting a touchdown and failing on tries for extra point.

Midway in the first the Warriors launched a drive from mid-field. With a first down on the O'Neill 4, Halfback Ray Peterson skirted left end to score.

O'Neill's End Dean Van Every set up the Blues' retaliatory counter in the second stanza on an end-around that netted 20 yards.

The third period was all Neligh's with Halfback Dick Rice scoring twice, once on a 50-yard sideline gallop and once on a plunge. His offensive spark was aided and abetted, however, by excellent cooperation from tackle-to-tackle on the Neligh side and a weakened O'Neill left side.

O'Neill's second touchdown was produced with a 30-yard run by Halfback Gordon Elkins in the fourth. The stage was set with aerials from Elkins to VanEvery.

This combination scored the extra point and made considerable eleventh hour yardage but the rally came too late.

Tackle Chuck Marsten was O'Neill's best defender, while Rice showed best offensively for Neligh.

A year ago O'Neill won 34 - 6 at Neligh.

The win makes No. 7 for the Warriors, who have lost one and tied one. O'Neill has won five and lost three.

Neligh closes the season Friday at Wayne and O'Neill closes against Atkinson at O'Neill.
