Also, we had apple pies this week, and I made some date-filled butterscotch cookies. I'll give you the recipe for them and some date bars.

When I bake, I usually make something that can be eaten at once like pie or cake, and then a couple of batches of cookies, which will keep something on hand for the rest of the week.

BROWN SUGAR DATE-FILLED COOKIES

½ cup shortening, 2 cups brown sugar, 2 well - beaten teaspoon vanilla extract, 31/2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar. Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar, add eggs and va-nilla. Add sifted dry ingredients, mix well. Form in roll 1½ inches in diameter, wrap in waxed paper and chill thoroughly or overnight. Slice and arrange half the slices on greased cooky sheet. Place 1 teaspoon date filling on each and top with remaining slices, press edges together with fork. Bake in moderate oven 350 F. 10 minutes. Makes 5 dozen cookies Cookies can be baked without using filling, too, if

you wish.
DATE NUT FILLING Combine 1 pound dates, pitted and chopped, ½ cup brown sugar, ½ cup water, cook until thick. Add ½ cup broken nut meats and cool.

Then add 2 cups of flour and 2 heaping tablespoons of cocoa (I sift the flour and accept together). Beat flour and cocoa together). Beat again. Now put 1 tablespoon soda in a cup and add 2 table-spoons of cold water, stir, then beat into above mixture. Last add a teaspoon of vanilla and beat batter about one hundred times. The harder you beat the batter, the better the cake. It can be baked in layers or loaf.
