Hi there, all you nice peo-
ple! What goes on at your
house this week? Six or sev-
en lily bulbs, all different
kinds, have been waiting for
me to plant them all week. I
may as well admit. Also, we
had apple pies this week, and
I made some date-filled but-
terscotch cookies. I'll give
you the recipe for them and
some date bars.

**When I bake, I usually
make something that can be
eaten at once like pie or
cake, and then a couple of
batches of cookies, which
will keep something on hand
for the rest of the week.
Thus I use the oven to its
fullest extent and don't
have to start it two or three
times a week.**

Before I forget, here are
those date-filled cookies—we
liked them but I had some
filling left over when I'd fin-
ished. The men didn't mind
this a bit.

**BROWN SUGAR DATE-
FILLED COOKIES**
½ cup shortening, 2 cups
brown sugar, 2 well-beaten
eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla ex-
tract, 3½ cups flour, ½ tea-
spoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 1
teaspoon cream of tartar.
Thoroughly cream shortening
and sugar, add eggs and van-
illa. Add sifted dry ingredi-
ents, mix well. Form in roll
1½ inches in diameter, wrap
in waxed paper and chill thor-
oughly or overnight. Slice
and arrange half the slices on
greased cookie sheet. Place 1
teaspoon date filling on each
and top with remaining slices,
press edges together with fork.
Bake in moderate oven 350 F.
10 minutes. Makes 5 dozen
cookies. Cookies can be baked
without using filling, too, if
you wish.

DATE NUT FILLING
Combine 1 pound dates, pit-
ted and chopped, ½ cup
brown sugar, ½ cup water,
cook until thick. Add ½ cup
broken nut meats and cool.

Stew Good to Keep—
That's right, when you make
oyster soup the next time, add
salted popcorn just before
serving. Just a little you un-
derstand! And did you know
that canned clams are cheaper
to buy than cove oysters and
we think they have more fla-
vor? I like clam soup so much.
I make it in top of double boil-
er, letting it stand over hot
water for half an hour to fully
get the flavor.
