26 TRAFFIC DEATHS IN NOVEMBER

Capt. C. J. Sanders, of the Nebraska safety patrol, reported that for the month of November there were 26 traffic fatalities in Nebraska. This is an increase of two over the same month last year.

The November fatalities brought the total fatalities for 1947 in Nebraska to 331—the highest number for the 11-month period in the history of traffic records in Nebraska.

Five of the November fatalities were caused by railroad crossing accidents. Captain Sanders stated that these fatalities, with the two railroad crossing fatalities at Grand Island on December 1, brought the 1947 railroad crossing fatality list to 34 as compared to 13 for 1946 and 15 for 1945.

Captain Sanders urges Nebraskans to remember that the month of December is the most dangerous month of the year: "Bad weather, more darkness, and the holiday rush—these are the reasons the December traffic death toll this year threatens to be the highest on record. So remember December—and drive and walk cautiously."

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
