

# Eagles Land 4 Berths on Mythical All-Holt Grid Team

## Matthews, Hilligas, Miles, Henderson Form the Backfield

The O'Neill Eagles landed four berths on The Frontier's 1947 all-Holt county mythical football team being announced today (Thursday). The Atkinson Balers and Ewing Tigers placed two each, while the St. Mary's Cardinals, Chambers Coyotes and Stuart Bronchos landed one each.

Summing up the crop of candidates for all-county honors, it might be said that there was a preponderance of good backs and a shortage of good linemen (after the cream had been taken off the top).

Except for a listless showing against Atkinson, which ended in a scoreless tie, the Eagles made the best team showing in the county this year and the four all-county performers had important roles in their team's record.

In picking an all-county eleven, The Frontier enlisted the aid of all coaches and officials in the county.

Participating in the balloting were: Coach F. E. Saindon, O'Neill; Coach Al Sipes, St. Mary's; Coach Randall Smith, Atkinson; Coach Kenneth Paul, of Stuart; Coach Marvin Miller, of Ewing; Coach L. A. Dale, of Chambers, assisted by Supt. G. H. Mead, of Atkinson; Supt. Ralph Gray, of Inman, and H. J. Hoffman, of O'Neill, the three of whom have been active in officiating.

As with most mythical teams, the backfield posts were hotly contested. O'Neill's Bob Matthews was a near-unanimous choice for fullback. Shorty Miles, of St. Mary's, and Lloyd Hilligas, of Chambers, both six-man performers, were unanimous selections for backfield spots among all who saw them play.

One coach was so strong in his praise for Miles that he predicted he could play on anybody's football team in the Elkhorn valley. Another nominated him as a guard. Miles' blocking has been particularly outstanding and, of course, his drive and tackling were the backbone of the parochial team. He is rugged and speedy.

Matthews, the O'Neill fullback, won the eye of most spectators and the envy of the most opposition coaches. His all-around, consistent performance gave him the all-county berth. Floyd Osborne was a power in the Atkinson backfield and his omission from the mythical team might be harshly censured in some circles. An 18-year-old and a junior, he was a late starter and didn't gather full momentum until the finish against O'Neill. He was included on many ballots but a mythical team can have only one fullback and Matthews and Miles had big headstarts. Jack Pruden, Ewing fullback, was in the running for a backfield spot. A 15-year-old sophomore weighing only 150 pounds, it was decided to give him time to mature.

Stuart's Henderson and a mate, Rex Coffman, practically dominated the Stuart team. Henderson did a terrific job against O'Neill, probably the best back on the field on that particular day. Atkinson's Jim White and O'Neill's Gordon Elkins pressed Henderson for the post.

Hilligas, who has played on better Chambers teams than the 1947 aggregation, was easily the Coyotes' outstanding boy. He was a great defensive player, a good passer and a hard runner. Only a few of the voters saw him play, but those that did were lavish in their praise.

Coffman, and Ewing's Dave Weyrich missed all-county back spots only because competition was a little too tough.

Dean Van Every, of O'Neill, and LeRoy Rossman, of Atkinson, were almost unanimous end choices. Van Every, specializing on end-around sprints and pass receptions, was one of the highest individual scorers in the county, and he was good on defense. Rossman was a fine defensive performer and played in the backfield on offense. Contenders for end were: Lorraine Montgomery, of Ewing; Larry Pribil, of St. Mary's; and Orin Butts, of Chambers.

The tackle spots were not particularly competitive. Herman Osborne, of O'Neill, and Lewis Vandersnick, of Ewing, found their way onto practically everyone's mythical team. Vandersnick was a hard charger and both were good at downfield blocking. Pressing for tackle position was Fred Hytrek, of Stuart.

Orland Anson, of Atkinson, and Chuck Marsten, of O'Neill, were not crowded for the guard positions, although William

Mullford and Orville Gilpin, both of Stuart, and Ewing's Lampert picked up several votes each.

The race for center — like backfield positions — was a hot potato. Pat Sanders' especially good showings against Holt county opposition won him the honor. He is only a sophomore, and has three seasons yet to go.

Strong contenders were Atkinson's Doug Rossman and O'Neill's Ralph Morrow, both juniors. All of which simply means that competition in that department might be interesting again next year.

Three watchcharm kids weighing less than 140 pounds squeezed into the honor line positions because there were no heavier, better hands to fill the shoes. These lightweights were: LeRoy Rossman, end; Orland Anson, guard, and Jerry Henderson, quarterback.

Placement on The Frontier's honor squad means nothing more than newspaper publicity, and gives the grey-haired coaches something to dream about.
