Administrative control of the beer industry in Nebraska is a three-way job.

It starts in the local community where municipal officials decide which applications for license they will approve. These officials also have the first responsibility for seeing that the licensed taverns in their communities are lawfully operated.

Second, there is the ever-ready force of the State Liquor Commission for higher administration, stricter consideration of licenses, continuous inspections of licensed beer selling outlets, and speedy punishment of law violators.

Finally, there is the service of the Nebraska Committee, U. S. Brewers Foundation, always watchful of the conduct of beer licenses, and always ready to cooperate with both the community and the state by supplying control from within.
