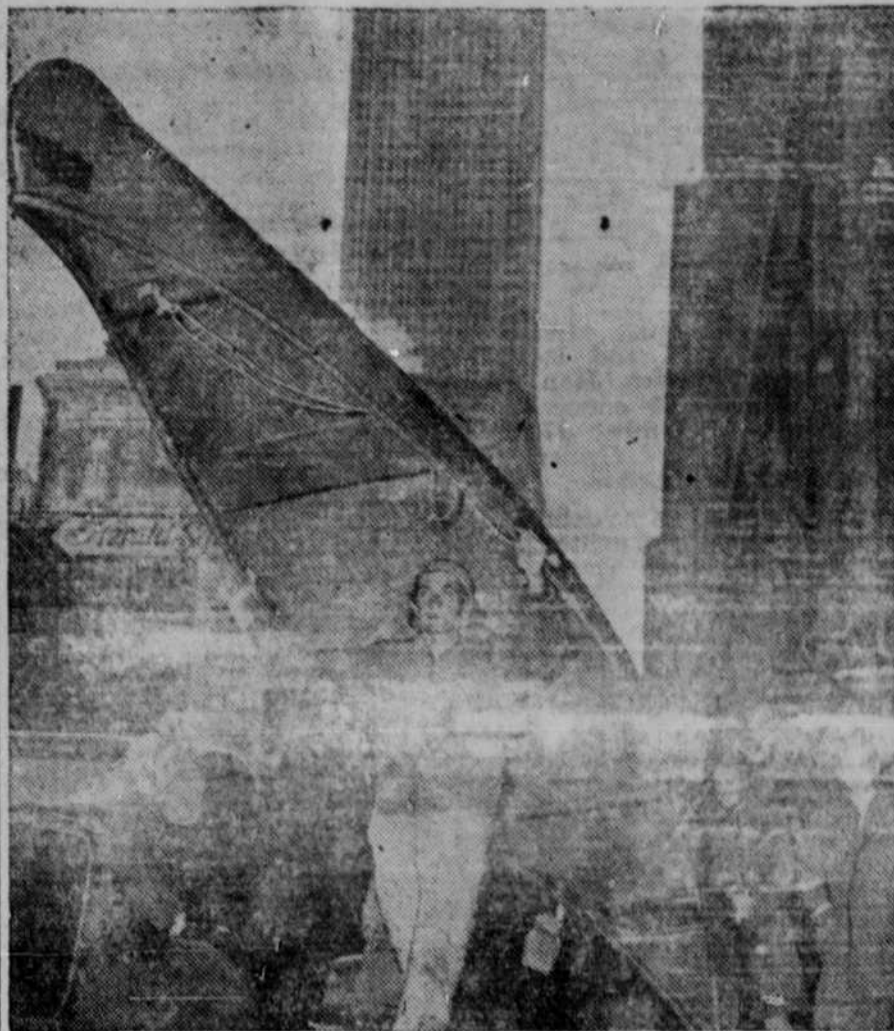
The couple was attended by Mr. and Mrs. Harold Calkins, brother and sister-in-law of the bride, also of O'Neill.
