## RECORD INCOME ON SHORT HARVEST

(Continued from page 1.)

Spring wheat is estimated at 3,000,000 bushels, a near-record and is estimated at 2,595,000 bushels.

But production was 2,970,000 bushels, down from 3,000,000 bushels from 1946. Barley output was 10,774,000 bushels, or a little more than a million bushels below the 1946 crop.

Considering the unusually late seeding of oats, the yield turned out well due to favorable weather during the growing season and to improved varieties.

Hay is one of Nebraska's principal crops because it supports the large cattle population.

The 1947 hay production of 4,549,000 tons was an increase of 22 per cent over the 1946 crop. At recognized hay prices, this means a valuation of \$59,000,000 against a 1946 value of \$45,000,000.

But the considerably improved prices for livestock must be computed in the hay valuation probably making the 1947 yield some 40 percent more valuable than that of 1946.

While the farm income has been increasing yearly due to higher prices for agriculture products, it does not necessarily follow that the higher income means more profit to the farmer.

Farmers have encountered higher cost of production and higher cost of goods. Farm commodities purchase less than they did a year ago with the price index showing the ratio of prices received by farmers compared to prices paid is one point below that of a year ago.

The parity of the prices of farm products now stands at 121 compared to 122 in 1946.

Over all, good prices have sustained the Nebraska farmer during 1947. The production trend was not altogether favorable and gave warning that weather still plays a key role in farm production.

These conditions suggest continued alertness by Nebraska agriculture toward improved land care to insure good yields in the years ahead. All agricultural groups are aware of this need and are alert to soil conservation practices that will assure continued farm prosperity. Mr. Howard concluded.
