'Having a Severe Blizzard,' Editor Writes on Historic Day

60 Years Ago
January 12, 1888
The storm of Thursday and Friday of last week was very severe, so much snow falling and drifting that the Friday evening train was blockaded and compelled to stay here about 48 hours. At this writing we are having another severe blizzard. (Editor's note: The reference is to the big blizzard of January 12, 1888.)

The weather of the two weeks past was something of a reminder of the winter of 1880-1881 when the snow drifts were piled up almost to the house tops and we had to "rustle" posts, etcetera, etcetera, for fuel. Those were times that tried men's hearts, their pocket-books and Hagerty's and McClure's post piles. One had to be a "common thief" from necessity those days, if not from choice. But there is no likelihood that this winter will be anything like that one. We hope not at least.

Married, at the residence of the Rev. L. M. DeLaMater, Inman, on January 3, 1888, and by him, Eliot E. Thompson and Miss Annie Aoskink, both of O'Neill. By the blessing of the God whom they serve, may they enjoy many happy years of usefulness.
