brown sugar, ½ teaspoon va-nilla, 1 egg, well beaten, 1 cup plus 2 tablesspoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon soda, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ cup chopped nuts. ½ cup raisins. Cream shortening, 2 sugars and vanilla until light and fluffy, add egg and beat, sift together flour, soda, and salt, adding to first mixture. Stir in bits, nuts and raisins. Mix thoroughly and drop from teaspoon on lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderate oven 10 minutes or until done.
