I've always stoutly maintained that it pays to pay more for a dress or coat and wear it a season longer, than to buy too cheap a dress or coat and never have it look like anything. Many of the most smartly dressed American women have only one or two really good dresses which they maneuver into many with accessories, collars and cuffs, scarves, costume and real jewelry and other schemes. It is astonishing, though, what you and the cleaner can do for your old outfit. If you can't have a new Spring coat, go over the old one carefully, mend it if it needs mending, firmly anchoring buttons.

Then have it cleaned and pressed. Brush your hat well and keep it that way. When not wearing it, stuff it with tissue paper to help it to hold its shape. Have your gloves spotlessly clean and mended if need be. See that your scarf is clean, and from the skin out see that the clothing you wear is clean, mended, and fresh. So many people try to save cleaning bills by wearing their clothes too long between cleaning. Your clothes will last

longer, look better and wear better if cleaned when they should be, kept properly pressed, and are properly taken care of between wearings. That, I might add, doesn't mean thrown over the back of a chair.

Hang your coat up properly on a coat hanger. Empty the pockets or their shape and tailoring will be spoiled. Button the buttons so the coat hangs straight on the hanger.

The same goes for your dresses. Remove belt and put it over the handle of the hanger, if you don't it may pull the dress out of shape, causing a sag. If you have a garment bag for your clothes, so much the better.

Under things should be laundered after each wearing. Your shoes should be kept with shoe trees in them, and cleaned and polished as often as they need it. Your purse can often be cleaned. Leather purses look better with a coat of liquid wax. Take everything out of your purse often, and put back into it only those things which have to be in your purse. Stuff the purse with tissue paper when not in use, it helps it to retain its original style and shape.

Give your clothing the proper care and you'll look better dressed. Your clothes will wear longer and look better. Never mind if you can't have a new outfit, but see that the old one is clean, pressed and up to snuff!

SCOTCH BROTH WITH NOODLES

One shoulder, lamb or pork bone, 1/2 medium sized onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 cup diced carrots, 1-3 package noodles (or homemade noodles are all right, too). Pour cold water over shoulder bone. Add onion, salt and pepper and boil 2 1/2 hours or until done, remove bone and add carrots and noodles. Simmer 20 minutes longer and serve hot. There can be other vegetables added to this soup if desired. It really hits the spot these cold winter days.

DID YOU KNOW THAT?

CHOCOLATE ANGEL FOOD

Five eggs, 1 1/2 cups sugar (sift before measuring), 1 1/2 cups flour, take out 2 tablespoons, 1/2 cup ice water, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 tablespoons cocoa. Separate eggs, and beat separately, place egg yolks in the large bowl of mixer, into the yolks put cold water and a pinch of salt, beat until thick and a light lemon color and add sugar which has been sifted two or three times and continue to beat. When this is well mixed, gradually add the flour to which the cocoa and baking powder have been added and which have been sifted several times. Beat egg whites to a point, add the cream of tartar, mix well and fold into the white entirely disappears. Put into an angel food cake pan and bake about 50 minutes at 300 degrees temperature. (Pre-

heat oven about 5 minutes.)

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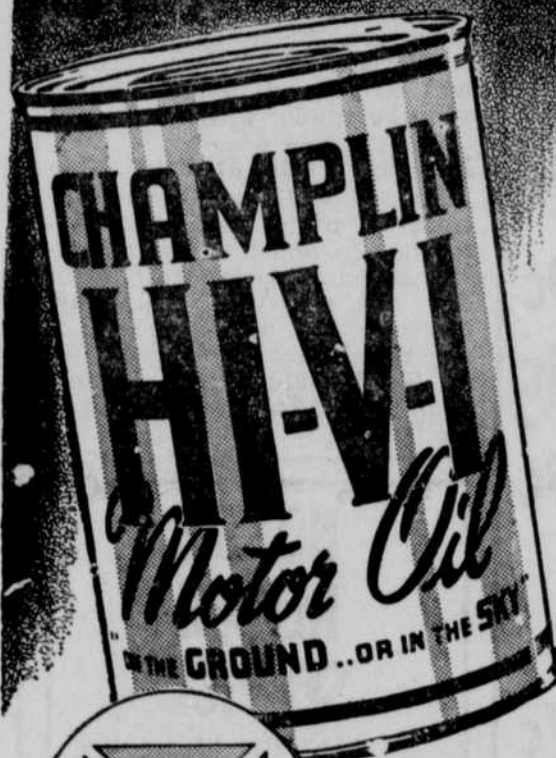
