You are hereby notified that a special election has been called in the manner provided by law, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Holt, Nebraska, to be held on Tuesday, April 13, 1948, between the hours of 8:00 A. M. at the usual voting places in the various precincts and townships in and throughout said County of Holt, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said County of Holt:

in by individuals and other clothing was sent in by the Holt county relief agency, which is also interested in the family.

But there are immediate needs for the Blacks before any formal relief can be worked out: Food and medical attention.

The Ewing townspeople have showered the family with gifts, which were collected at the library and the committee looked after the distribution.

Rev. Vogel told The Frontier that any readers of this newspaper could channel gifts through the committee and it would be properly used. Food-stuffs would be more than welcomed and the committee will portion it out to the family. Cash will be used only for staple foods and for the medical care that is urgent.

Rev. Vogel added that the committee would gladly forward to The Frontier for publication an acknowledgement of all cash donations.

Thirsty Cowboys Turned to Shootin', Mr. Hull Recalls

REDBIRD — Mr. and Mrs. Michael Hull, colorful north-Holt county residents, are a veritable reservoir of pioneer history.

They often tell and folks like to listen about the many trials of the early settlers.

Mr. Hull was born in Boone-Burro, Ia., on November 15, 1868, and moved to the Blackbird community, north of O'Neill, in 1893. Mrs. Hull was born in Union county, South Dakota, on April 4, 1874, and moved with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hazland, to Chelsea in 1878, then to Padlock, and then to Redbird.

The Hulls were married in 1894 at O'Neill. They became the parents of 6 children, 4 of whom are living.

The Hulls have been farmers most of the intervening years, except for several years that Mr. Hull operated a cream station and feed store at Redbird.

They saw the Redbird post-office opened for the first time. They say the village derived its name from the number of pretty redbirds that flocked near Redbird creek, which empties into the Niobrara river near here.

Mr. Hull says he prefers north-Holt to Iowa because of the beautiful scenery and vegetation. In early days the pioneers found sport in hunting wolves and even bobcats.

Mr. Hull jokingly says the biggest fish he's seen in these parts "got away with the weighing scales on their back!"

In the early days the good neighbor policy prevailed everywhere, even with the Indians, who were across the river.

The Hulls had to go to Lynch to get groceries, for the swift Niobrara, as there were no bridges. Not infrequently the team and spring wagon would get into dangerous currents and the month's food supply was swept downstream.

Mr. Hull is now 79 and Mrs. Hull is 74, and both are in

comparatively good health. On December 19, 1945 they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Hull recalls vividly the great blizzard of 1888. She also tells how her parents used to drive a team of oxen to O'Neill for "chuck" or food sometimes requiring over 2 days to make the roundtrip.

Mr. Hull recounts how cowboys used to congregate in Redbird on trips to the trading post. Often, when their supply of amber fluid had been depleted, the still thirsty cowboys would get careless with their shooting.

Mrs. Hull does all her own housekeeping, maintains a garden and ten's chickens. Mr. Hull chomps lots of wood the year-around.

The living sons and daughters are: Charles Hull, of Crete; Mrs. Thirza Crawford of Redbird; Henry Hull, of near Verdel, and Mrs. Grace Truax, of Lynch. The Hulls have 15 grandchildren and 1 great-grandchild.
