The Law Places Selection of Beer Retailers in YOUR Hands

With relicensing time here, let's review what the law says about selection of beer retailers. Nebraska's liquor control law forbids the brewers or wholesalers from having any financial interest in the selection of licensees. It places the selection in the hands of public licensing officials.

These officials have the right to examine, under oath, any applicant for a retail license or renewal. The board may authorize its agent or attorney to act in obtaining any desired information.

Further, the law provides that the local governing body must consider every signed complaint from any citizen of a violation of the law or any objectionable conduct on the part of an applicant. A new license may be denied or a renewal refused if there is cause.

This Committee urges you to cooperate by bringing law violations to the attention of licensing bodies.
