

MRS. TAFT ECHOES BOB'S PLATFORM

in the Orient and in Washington with his late father, and also his work as a food administrator in European recovery after World War I. The program was essentially the same as the Marshall plan but "involved a lot less money."

The matronly Mrs. Taft sniped frequently at the Roosevelt family and pointed out a marked difference between our sons and the Roosevelt sons: The 4 Tafts stay out of the newspapers.

"Washington," she said laughingly, "is about as foreign a place as you can get." She went on to say that she didn't believe a day in Russia and talk with Stalin were necessary to any man to know how to fight Communism.

She said that it was "unfortunate that President Roosevelt was not at the peak of his power at Tehran and Yalta." She attributes the present international situation to some of the "bungling policies" of the Truman administration. "The only background President Truman had for Potsdam was with Pendergast in Kansas City."

"For 16 years," Mrs. Taft continued, "we have been in a state of emergency under

the New Deal. Some of it was real emergency and some of it was imaginary."

The San Francisco conference was a step forward in the right direction, Mrs. Taft said in reflecting her husband's views. "Bob feels the only hope for peace is a world court of strength and justice. He feels that such a court of international law should be arranged so that countries could submit their difficulties to the tribunal. There is hope for peace," she continued, "if we're given time to develop it."

Mrs. Taft was met by a reception committee headed by Mrs. E. M. Gallagher, of O'Neill, and was introduced by Mrs. Gallagher at the public gathering.

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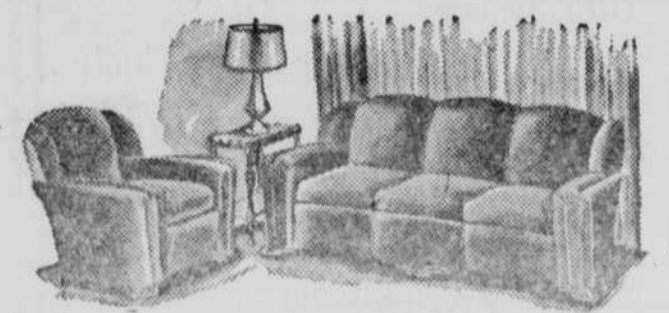
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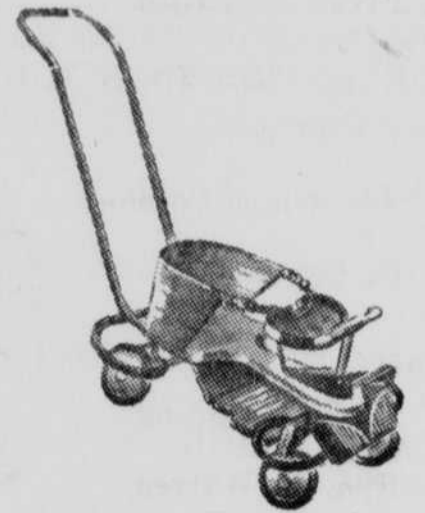
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
