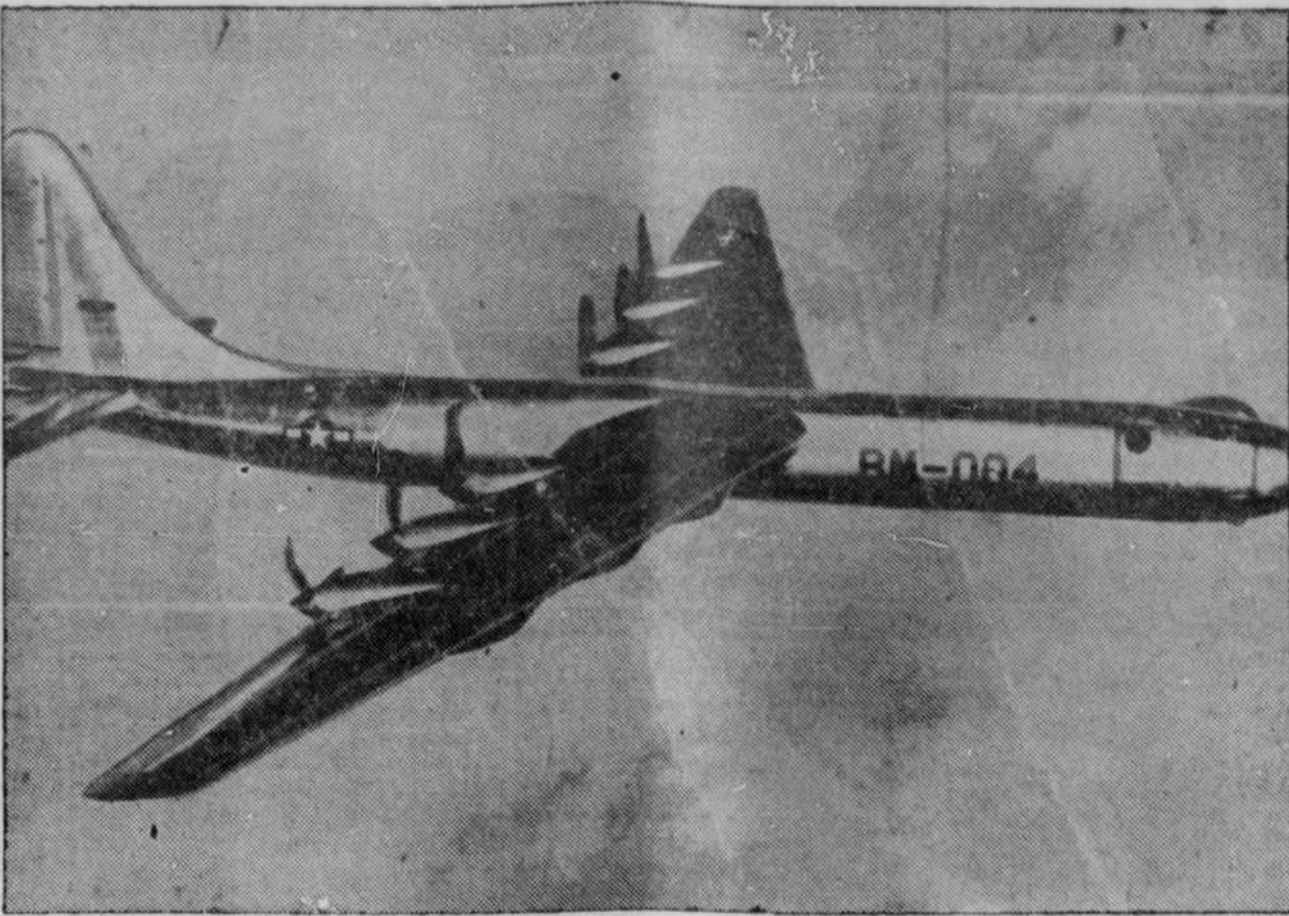
PAGE — George Fayette Jackson, 73, who died recently in Powell River general hospital was buried in Forest Lawn, Vancouver.

NOT EXACTLY POCKET-SIZE . . . The way things go these days it is difficult to say, at any given moment, which is the world's biggest or fastest airplane. Right now, however, the world's largest bombing plane is the Consolidated Vultee B-36. It can carry 10,000 pounds of bombs for 10,000 miles. The

huge ship, fuselage of which is shaped like a torpedo, is driven by six 28-cylinder engines that can give it a total of 18,000 horsepower. It has a wingspan of 230 feet, length of 163 feet and is nearly 47 feet high—equal to the height of a 4-story building—when in taxiing position.

60 YEARS AGO
April 19, 1888

On Tuesday last, the estimable lady, who was the wife of Hon. Patrick Fahy, of O'Neill, breathed her last at 2034 Prairie avenue in Chicago, Ill., after a protracted illness. Mrs. Fahy, who was in her 43rd year, was a sister to the Hon. John Fitzgerald, of Lincoln, and was born in Ireland.

Prof. Elisha Gray has another great invention in mind. It is called the telegraph. He describes it, "By this invention you can sit at your office in Chicago, take a pencil in hand, write a message to me, and as your pencil moves, a pencil here in my laboratory moves simultaneously and forms the same letters in the same way. They were a fine lot of fellows and will be a credit to our regular army wherever they go. May the God of battles watch over them.
