O'Neill, Neb., Aug. 12, 1931. The Holt County Board of Equalization met at the call of the Clerk for the purpose of making the annual levy and such other business as may properly come before this meeting.

Meeting called to order by the chairman; minutes of previous meeting were read and on motion were approved as read.

Delegation from Page and Atkinson appeared before the Board in regard to appropriations and tax levies for the ensuing year.

August 12, 1931 1 o'clock p. m.

Holt County Board of Equalization met as per adjournment; all members present. Meeting called to order by the chairman.

THIS IS TO CERTIFY that at a session of the State Board of Equalization and Assessment, held at the State Capitol in the year A. D. 1931, pursuant to an act of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, approved April 23, 1928, the following rate of tax was determined and levied by said board for the year 1931 on the total valuation as shown in the abstract on your county assessor, now on file in this office, and as equalized by said state board:

Total valuation \$26,002,372 Gen'l fund 1.93 M. on the Dol. \$50,185 Capitol " .11 M. on the Dol. \$ 2,860 Total 2.04 M. on the Dol. \$53,045

The above amounts will be charged to Holt County upon the books of the Auditor of Public Accounts.

When your tax list is footed you will certify the amounts of State Funds thereon to the State Auditor of Public Accounts.

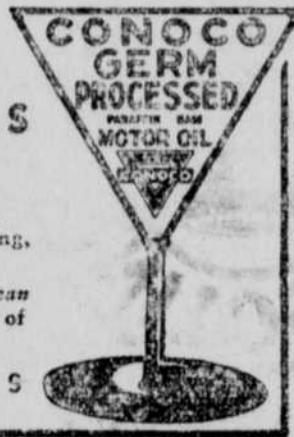
