Minutes of meeting of December 30, 1931, were read and, on motion, were approved as read.

Mr. Weekes of the O'Neill National Bank and J. F. Gallagher of the First National Bank, appeared before the Board in regard to the matter of a service charge for the handling of County deposits.

The following letter was presented and read at this meeting:

Hon. Board of Supervisors,
Holt County.
Gentlemen:

In the matter of acting as depository for county funds for the ensuing year, we have made no application to set as such depository and do not feel that we can unless some legal method can be arranged whereby we can be reimbursed for the work and actual expense to us in handling the account. Heretofore the County Treasurer has used the two banks in O'Neill to handle the active accounts, i.e. the accounts in which deposits are made and checks drawn from day to day. This bank has handled the active account from January to July each year. The last six months we handled this active account we received and collected over 5000 checks and drafts drawn on banks outside of this county and cashed about the same number of checks drawn on us by the County Treasurer.

Our experience in the past with this active account has demonstrated that we cannot loan the funds as the account frequently fluctuates from \$40,000 to \$50,000 to a few hundred dollars within thirty days. On this daily balance we pay 2 per cent interest and most of the funds are no kept with the Federal Reserve Bank on which they pay us no interest.

Hon. Board of Supervisors,
Holt County:

We regard it as manifestly unfair that we be expected to assume the responsibility and expense of handling this active account and receive a service charge of one per cent on daily balance when we are paying the county 2 per cent: furnishing the stationary, doing the labor, and assuming the expense of collecting at par all the checks taken by the County Treasurer on points within the county and in addition thereto about 5,000 item drawn on banks out side of the county.

Banks are now charging customers from 10 to 25 cents per hundred for cashing checks or drafts drawn on banks located out side hte county.

We will agree to continue to handle the accounts and pay 2 per cent on daily balance less a service charge of one per cent and the county to furnish their own stationary and pay 10 cents per hundred or fraction thereof for such checks or drafts drawn on banks outside the county and deposited by the County Treasurer. We agree such charge for exchange to not exceed one per cent of our daily average balance for the year. Otherwise we desire to discontinue handling the account.

Jan. 7, 1931.
To The Honorable Board of Supervisors of Holt County Nebraska.
Gentlemen:

You are hereby notified that the First National Bank of O'Neill, Nebraska and the O'Neill National Bank of O'Neill, Nebraska; the two Banks in which we carry our checking accounts, have this date refused to accept our deposit of County money.

The reason given, is that they feel that they are entitled to a service charge for handling the account; and in view of the fact that is going to be a great inconvenience for this office to function properly without adequate banking facilities, we appeal to you to take this matter up with the banks at once and get it settled in some satisfactory manner, as it is going to be almost impossible for us to get along without a safe place to keep the County money.

They have tendered us a draft for the balance of the County money on hand.

Kindly advise us as soon as possible, what if any arrangements you are able to make with the banks in this County, which will insure us a County Depository, with which to transact the business of the County.
