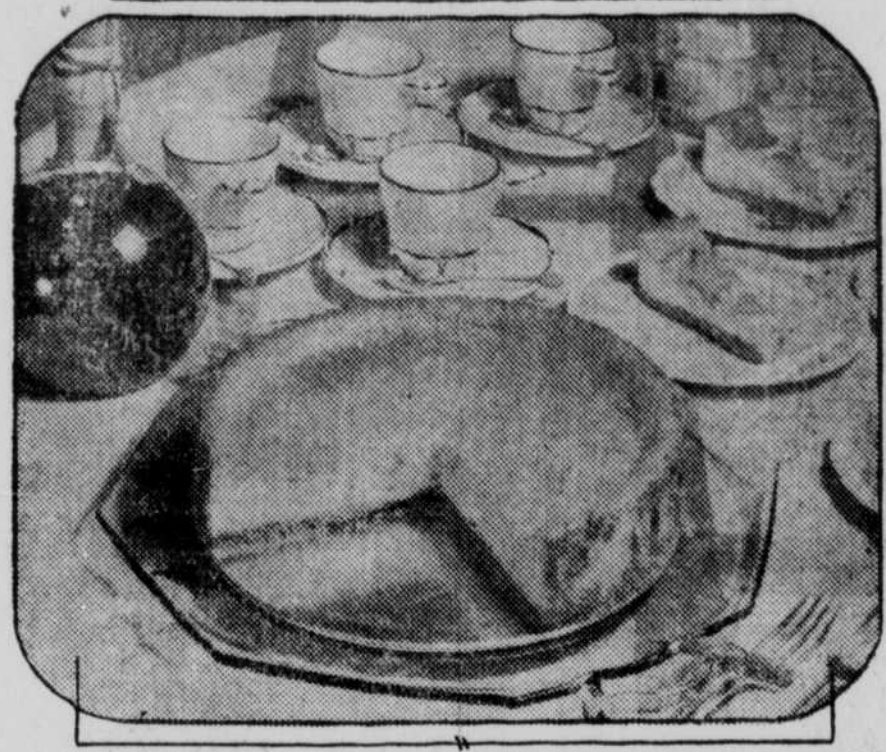

- "PHILADELPHIA" CREAM CAKE**
- 1 pkg. zwieback
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 6 1/2 cakes "Philadelphia" Cream Cheese
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 4 eggs
 - 1 cup cream (1/2 pint)

Roll the zwieback into crumbs, add the butter and 2 tablespoons of sugar creamed together. Blend thoroughly, put into a 9-inch spring form mold and press down evenly on the bottom.

Mix the cup of sugar with flour and salt and cream thoroughly with the "Philadelphia" Cream Cheese. Add vanilla and yolks of eggs and beat. Add cream and mix again.
