### Old English Law Made Churchgoing Compulsory

Golfers, picnickers, Sunday autoists would be out of luck if an old English law were in force today. The act of uniformity, 1532, required:

"All persons, except those dissenting from the worship or doctrines of the Church of England and usually attending some place of worship not belonging to the Church of England, are, if they have no lawful or reasonable excuse for absence, to endeavor to attend their parish church or accustomed chapel, or, if reasonably prevented from so doing, some other place where the divine service of the Church of England is performed, on all Sundays and other days ordained and used to be kept as holy days, and to abide there orderly and soberly during the time of common prayer, preaching or other divine service there performed."

Failure to observe this law renders the offending "parishioner or inhabitant of a parish" who is not legally exempt from attendance at divine service on Sundays and holy days "liable in proceedings taken against him in the ecclesiastical courts to be censured for the offense, admonished as to its attendance in the future, and to be condemned in the costs of the proceedings."

### AN AFRICAN ARMY IN FRANCE Force of 4 Million Men Prepared for Service in Europe

France-in-Africa has made enormous strides forward within the last few years. Even among Frenchmen the truth about this progress is little realized.

The value of the French territories in Africa as providers of dusky soldiers is ever-present in the minds of French military men. One of the latter said to me in Paris:

"Practically every serious invasion of France has come from the direction of Asia; only one, that of the Moors in the eighth century, A. D., came from Africa. Out of Asia came the Huns under Attila; out of the north of Europe came those descendants of Asiatics, the Goths; and, within our own era, the Germans. On the road between Asia and Europe are the Russian Bolsheviks, menacing not alone France, but the whole capitalistic world.

"Alive to the peril north and east of us, we French are busily training an African army to be used in conjunction with the regular French army against the menace from the direction of Asia. In the next war,

When a man becomes insolvent, when he realizes that he owes more than he owns, and that his expenditures are more than his income, there is nothing for him to do, if he would become solvent, but reduce his expenditures to the point where income is very considerably greater than expenses.

In the World War, France made a successful beginning at using African soldiers against her European foes.

Encouraged by the record made by these troops, the French now aim to place in the field, if need be, African contingents for outnumbering those who saw service in France between 1914 and 1918.

Assuming that French drillmasters can render available, for a future conflict, a proportion of the population of French Africa only half as great as the total number of natives of France-in-Europe mobilized in the course of the World War, France will have a colonial army about 4 million strong to add to her European army.

### GIRL'S BLOOD MADE FLAG A Red Sun Emblem of Japan Drawn From Pricked Fingers

Japanese schoolgirls, fragile as butterflies and small as pixies, must not faint at the sight of blood. To test their courage seven Tokio high school girls gathered recently around a white cloth in

the center of which they had drawn a circle. After a solemn soprano chant the maidens pricked their fingers deeply, held them over the circle until it grew red and the cloth became the flag of Japan.

This flag the seven schoolgirls dispatched to Crown Prince Chichibu's crack 3rd regiment, which is part of the imperial forces still holding Shanghai.

Because Emperor Hirohito saw from the first the basic wisdom of Japan's Shanghai adventure, Crown Prince Chichibu (a daring skier and steady-nerved huntsman) is not and never has been with his regiment at Shanghai.

### Outlines Six Steps for Land Use Plan

"Much lower prices for what he sells, higher prices for what he buys, and higher taxes—these are the upper and nether millstones which are slowly grinding the life out of rural America," said Prof. M. L. Wilson of Montana State College in a radio address, over an NBC network in the program of the National Advisory Council on Radio in Education. "Fortunately, there is a way out," Wilson stated, "but the way demands a reversal of the basic land policy of the nation."

The speaker presented six steps in a program for land utilization.

First in the list of six fundamentals suggested by Professor Wilson is the repeal of the Homestead Act and the enactment of a new national land policy bill which, he pointed out, is essential because there is no more land in the public domain suitable for farming and home building.

"Secondly, each state should classify its lands, develop a state-wide land use plan and institute a program of action," Professor Wilson advised. The third step is that poor land, as determined by land utilization studies, should be taken out of production.

Additional steps in the plan presented by Professor Wilson include the modification of land taxes and reorganization of local government; the withdrawal of poor lands from production to solve the surplus problem. Suggesting how this might be carried out, he explained the "Domestic Allotment Plan" which calls for the issuance of certain allotments to farmers to grow the kinds of crops they have been growing, the farmer to receive tariff protection on the allotted acres. Finally, Wilson recommended part time farming and the decentralization of industry.

To prevent men who are farming unsuitable land from joining the ranks of the unemployed, Professor Wilson stated that industry must adopt a new policy coupling industry with small farm agriculture. Small farms, located near industrial plants, he said, would not produce the great food staples of which there is a surplus.

#### Two-Year Trip in Eight Days

Maj. Ewart S. Grogan, who 32 years ago made a toilsome two-year journey, mostly on foot, the length of Africa, recently covered the same route from Cairo, Egypt, to Cape Town, South Africa, in eight days. He made the trip by air, and instead of "roughing it" as before he looked down on Africa from a comfortable armchair in an air liner and relaxed at stops in rest houses.

#### Covered Bridges Going

The covered bridge is fast disappearing from Vermont roads, and it is estimated at least 1,000 of the picturesque old wooden structures have been supplanted by other bridges within the past four years. Much of the reconstruction was necessitated by the floods of 1927.
