An Increase In 4-H Club Enrollment. 1932 4-H Club enrollments for Holt countty show an increase of ten per cent over last year. Thirty-five Clubs have an enrollment of 352 members. Last year thirty-two Clubs had 321 members enrolled.

Clothing Clubs head the list with fourteen Clubs and 135 girls enrolled.
